"It started all of a sudden. While watching television, I was shocked to learn how a gas cylinder blast left three siblings orphaned. I went to the spot and decided to help them. But I did not know what to do and how to do it. I met the district collector seeking government aid for them, but in vain. I finally decided that the only way I could secure their future was by providing them education."

Nibedita, however, did not have enough money to bear their educational expenses. She started cutting down on her own expenses. So much so, that she stopped her only son's tuition classes to fund these siblings. After completing their education, one of the two sisters has got a job under the Gram Tarang Yojana while their brother, who was in Class V then, is pursuing BSc now.

Nibedita says she was depressed after losing her second child and had major health issues when she came to know about the cylinder blast. "I was battling for life before these three kids came into my life. I used to spend most of the days in hospital after my second delivery.

I got a new lease after they became a part of my life. Since then, I have never visited a hospital or taken any medicines."

Her first successful endeavour encouraged her to help more such students. In fact, she made it a mission of her life to spot meritorious students who find it hard to follow their dreams due to financial issues. With the help of some Good Samaritans, voluntary organisations and, of course, her husband and son, she successfully funded these

students' education.

Recalling her earlier days, she says, "I belong to a conservative family in Nayagarh. My parents wanted to marry me off after matriculation just like that of my three sisters. They were not allowed to study further, but I was determined to complete my graduation. After graduating from Nayagarh College, I got married. Soon after my marriage, I started lending a helping hand to children in my neighbourhood who were good at studies but did not have anything to eat. Once I went to my neighbour's home. There I found a five-year-old boy hungry as they didn't have food for that day. I felt bad and decided to help the boy who used to come first in his school. I kept providing rice to the family without my in-laws' knowledge."

This is just one of those examples when Nibedita went out of her way to help the needy.

This Mothers' Day, Sunday POST presents tales of two such women - Nibedita Lenka and Sunita Panda - who are not biological mothers but have managed to shape the life of underprivileged kids and those living in shanties.

Nibedita Lenka

Known as Yashoda Maa for underprivileged children, Nibedita reaches out to slum dwellers and makes them realise the importance of education in life. She not only has prevented hundreds of kids in remote areas from discontinuing their studies, but also helped them find jobs. A resident of Bhubaneswar, Nibedita offers selfless love to the needy enabling them to have a good life that would otherwise be

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Subhrasmita Barada, daughter of a cycle mechanic of Nayagarh district, wanted to get admission in college after securing 90 per cent marks in HSC, but she was strapped for funds. Nibedita extended a helping hand. With her support, Subhrasmita has completed Plus II Science and also B Tech from CIPET.

Srikant Sahoo from Puri, who had secured 10th position in the HSC exam, managed to secure 12th position in the XII Board Exam thanks to Nibedita's support and guidance. He lost his mother and was finding it hard to continue studies. Nibedita helped him for his further studies.

Ā beggar's son and another student from Kendrapara got admission in NIT Rourkela due to Nibedita's intervention.

The list of her good work goes on and on.

There are students preparing for medical, banking and other competitive examinations due to Nibedita's support.

Rani Hembram of Keonjhar district was spotted working in a brick kiln so that she could bear her expenses for higher studies. She

After Rani's story was highlighted in the media, Nibedita came to her rescue and got her admitted to Nabajyoti Science College in Bhubaneswar. Rani says, "I am grateful to Maa for making my life better and will try to live up to her expectations."

Nibedita is thankful to her husband Prafulla Kumar Lenka, a retired government employee, and their son Punjit Kumar Lenka for standing by her side. For her exemplary work, Nibedita has been bestowed with the Mother Teresa award, Amma Gaurav award, Adarsha Nari award, Sambhavi award and Change Maker award, among others.

Sunita Panda

Sunita Panda is known as mother for couples having marital or family disputes in Rayagada district. She has so far reunited about 85 families. Besides, she has solemnised marriages of six poverty-stricken girls.

"When experiencing acute poverty in families, girls residing in rural pockets in particular see marriage as an option to reduce family expenses and gain financial security. This idea is reinforced by

> patriarchal

> > norms that devalue girls. Because girls have less access to education and low social and economic status, they are often economically dependent on men. They may see marriage as their only option. But they find it hard to manage another family at an early age and seek my help to overcome their issues. That apart, couples often face issues pertaining to dowry and money. I solve whatever problems couples face with the help of my husband," says Sunita who is a teacher at an upper primary school at Padmapur block in Rayagada.

"When I was pursuing graduation, I got married. Though my husband allowed me to continue my studies, in return, he wanted me to keep his mother, who lost her husband at the age of 22, happy all the time. On the other hand, my mom-in-law was known for her hot temperament at the beginning. I was advised not to answer her back ever. Besides, I was asked to maintain a great bonding with my husband's maternal uncles who were not happy with our marriage. We planned for a child soon after the marriage. Living up to everyone's expectations was difficult while raising my daughter. Preparing for examinations, higher studies only added to the burden. But I managed to win my mother-in-law's heart. I always give my example to girls who find it hard to manage their families."

She is always against the idea eloping when parents do not give consent for marriage. "When lovebirds fail to convince their parents for marriage, they come to me. I make their parents understand their feelings for each other and more often than not I manage to bring a happy ending," signs off Sunita who is a poet and anchor apart from being an awardwinning teacher. She is also a recipient of Biju Patnaik Women's Achiever Award (2020), Best Prativa Award (2020), Mother Teresa Award (2020), Best Social Worker Award (2020).






Sintra

Enchanting Sintra is one of the gems in Portugal's glittering sightseeing crown. Recognised by UNESCO for its remarkable cultural landscape, this historic and captivating town is definitely worth putting aside a full day to absorb. It's one of the most popular day trips from Lisbon. Clustered under the lip of the wooded Serra da Sintra hills, the town is dominated by the landmark Palácio Nacional, its signature twin chimneys looming over a pretty square edged with houses painted in a palette of pale pink and ochre with splashes of yellow.

Europe's most alluring cities. Set on the banks of the River Tagus, this vibrant Atlantic port is scattered over a series of hills that heighten its splendid waterfront location. Exploring the city's historic core is a journey into its fascinating past - a heritage exemplified by celebrated visitor attractions, such as the mighty Castelo de São Jorge and Alfama, the oldest part of Lisbon. A collection of world-class museums extends the cultural experience. To the east, away from the city center, you can marvel at the modernity of Parque das Nacões and its crowd-pulling sites such as the brilliant Oceanário.






Tavira

Cited by many a guidebook as the most captivating town in the Algarve, Tavira does indeed tick all the scenic boxes. The Rio Gilão cuts a smile through this pleasantly laid-back town, with a Roman footbridge connecting one side with the other. The waterfront makes for a wonderful walk, before or after you've uncovered the rest of Tavira's historic treasures. The castle walls provide glorious views across the old town and the nearby coast. You can also explore the Igreia de Santa do Castelo, the grandiose church where warrior knights are entombed.

Coimbra

The historic hilltop university in Coimbra is just one reason to visit this venerated Portuguese city. But the wealth of additional visitor attractions, much of them clustered around the Velha Universidade, classified by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site, merits a full day's sightseeing. The undoubted highlight of a tour of the old university campus is the stunning Biblioteca Joanina, a Baroque gem of gilded and marbled wood and frescoed ceilings.



Parque Natural da Serra da Estrela

For good reason, the highest peaks on mainland Portugal, the Serra da Estrela, are called the "star mountains." Rising to 1,993 meters above sea level at its highest point, the range, or more precisely the plateau, is a dramatic natural feature of central Portugal. It is often snowcapped in winter, when opportunistic skiers take advantage of what is probably the shortest ski season in Europe. Otherwise, the granite escarpments and glacier-cut valleys are classic hiking country, with a network of signed long-distance paths and tracks covering the terrain. Along the way, walkers can take in some absolutely stunning countryside and absorb the traditional character of the place, epitomized in villages like Linhares and Valezim.

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Nature and wildlife photographer Avinash Khemka has spent more than 300 nights over the last 10 years and captured nearly 10,000 images to present this stunningly beautiful coffee table book to the nature lovers

BHUBANESWAR: With more than three lakh migratory birds visiting its wetlands in winter every year, Mangalajodi, a 10 sqkm patch of marshland which is just 90 minutes road journey from Bhubaneswar near Tangi Chandpur of Khurda district, holds the distinction of being one of the greatest conservation stories of the world.

Coffee table book *The Magic of Mangalajodi,* released April 21 by Odisha Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik, showcases the avian paradise Mangalajodi like never before.

"This book is the culmination of ten years of photography, hard work and a journey from hobby to passion to strong desire of giving back to nature," says Avinash Khemka who has spent more than 300 nights to capture over 10,000 images in his lens using state-of-the-art photography equipment.

The Cuttack-based industrialist, social worker and a renowned nature and wildlife photographer has been doing photography since 2012. He has used the medium to disseminate and popularise the conservation story of Mangalajodi to the widest possible audience.

For the unversed, Avinash, in collaboration with Panchami Manoo Ukil, a Bhubaneswar-based educationist and an avid bird-watcher, founded *Song of the Wild*, a not-for-profit organisation in 2018 to focus on conservation of natural habitats and wildlife. As a part of its core philosophy, the organisation focuses on engaging the younger generation with natural habitats and outdoors, in order to inculcate the consciousness and ethics of nature conservation in them.

It also organised in 2018 a photo exhibition of photographs of Mangalajodi shot by Khemka at Lalit Kala Akademi Regional Centre, Bhubaneswar, which received huge attention from the visitors. After the success of the expo, the duo had been working on the coffee table book.

All proceeds from the sales of this book will be used to fund conservation initiatives by *Song of the Wild* in Mangalajodi, they say. PNN
