Bhubaneswar, May 25: Odisha recorded 70.23 per cent voter turnout till midnight (00.15 am) in the six Lok Sabha and 42 Assembly segments, the elections for which were held Saturday,

Voting was held in Sambalpur, Keonjhar, Dhenkanal, Cuttack, Bhubaneswar and Puri Parliamentary constituencies along with 42 Assembly segments within the jurisdiction of these Lok Sabha seats.

Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik walked to the Aerodrome Upper Primary School near his residence here to cast his vote. "We will form a stable government in the state," he told reporters.

Chief Electoral Officer NB Dhal said voting was peaceful so far in the 10,581 polling stations, barring some

JAGDEV AT IT AGAIN

Bhubaneswar: BJP's Khurda Assembly nominee Prasant Jagdev allegedly entered a polling booth and attacked the polling and presiding officers at booth no-114 at Kaunripatna near Rajsunakhala under Begunia Assembly constituency. He also alleged to have broken the EVM machine inside the booth. This sparked tension in the area. Later, he fled the scene. On being informed, police chased him and brought him to the police station where he denied his involvement in the incident and staged a sit-in out side the police station.

61.46% polling in Phase VI

New Delhi: An approximate voter turnout of 61.46 per cent was recorded in the sixth phase of the Lok Sabha elections Saturday in 58 constituencies across six states and two Union Territories with the polling percentage in the Janual Mahal region of West Bengal touching 79.78. Jharkhand recorded a turnout of 63.76 ner cent. Uttar Pradesh 54.03 per cent, Bihar 55.24 per cent, Jammu and Kashmir 54.46 per cent. Harvana 61.16 per cent. Odisha 70.23 and Delhi 57.82 per cent, according to the figures released by the Election Commission (EC) as of 12.15 am. The EC said polling percentage in the Anantnag-Rajouri seat in Jammu and Kashmir is the highest in many decades.

torate exercised their franchise. The highest 73.81 per cent voting was recorded in Puri Lok Sabha seat, followed by Dhenkanal (73.69), Sambalpur (73.31), Keonjhar (71.93), Cuttack (67.36) and Bhubaneswar (62.00).

Among the 42 Assembly segments. Athamallik recorded the highest 85.42 per cent voter turnout while the lowest 51.00 pc was registered at Bhubaneswar-North segment by 00.15 hrs, according to the app.

As many as 35,000 security personnel including 121 companies of central forces were deployed in different booths.

THREE DEATHS INSIDE BOOTHS

Bhubaneswar: Bhubaneswar: Three persons died at separate places during the third phase of voting in the state, Saturday. In the first incident, an elderly woman, identified as Kumudini Dalei, 60, succumbed inside a polling booth at Patharapunji village under Baghuapalli panchayat of Nayagarh district. Kumudini was waiting inside a booth to cast vote when she felt uncomfortable. She was rushed to a nearby hospital where doctors declared her dead. Similarly, a polling agent died inside booth no-136 at Bahalunda village under Nuabaga panchayat of Hindol Assembly constituency in Dhenkanal district. The deceased was identified as Sukadev Pattnayak. According to sources, Sukadev suddenly felt sick while on duty and became unconscious. He was taken to Hindol sub-divisional hospital where he died. In the third incident, Sujata Mitra,51, a polling officer of booth no 114 in Hadibandhu School under Barabati-Cuttack Assembly segment, died while on duty. The cause of death was yet to be ascertained. The deceased was a teacher in a government primary school at Bakharabad in Cuttack

EC releases LS seat-wise data

Commission Saturday came out with Lok Sabha constituency-wise data on the number of votes cast in the first five phases of the elections and asserted that there is a pattern in creating false narratives and mischievous design to vitiate the electoral process. It said that any alteration in the

number of votes polled is not possible. The poll panel came out with the absolute number of voters on its own a day after the Supreme Court refused to issue directions to it on an NGO's plea for uploading polling booth-wise voter turnout data on its website. The EC said it has decided to further expand the format of turnout data to include the absolute number of voters in every parliamentary constituency.

The absolute numbers are discernable parliamentary constituency-wise by all citizens by applying the turnout percentage to total electors, both already made available in the public domain, the poll panel said. Electors are those who are part of the electoral roll and eligible to voters. Voters are those who actually cast their vote in an election. While EC had been issuing turnout percentage, there had been demands to make the actual number of voters in every phase public.

4 kids among 27 killed in Rajkot game zone fire

Rajkot, May 25: At least 27 persons, including four children under the age of 12, were killed in a massive fire that swept through a game zone teeming with people enjoying a summer vacation outing in this city of Gujarat Saturday evening, officials said.

The death toll is likely to go up, they added. Police have detained the owner of the TRP Game Zone and the manager while the state government assigned the probe to a Special

Investigation Team. Relief and rescue operations have been underway at the affected game zone for more than six hours after the blaze erupted at a structure built using metal and fibre sheets for gaming activities at around 4:30 pm, officials said, adding that the structure collapsed due to the huge fire.

"So far we have confirmed the death of 27 persons in the fire incident. The bodies are charred beyond recognition and hence their identification is difficult," said ACP Radhika Bharai. According to eyewitnesses, several

people, including children were playing games at the game zone, located on Nana-Mava Road, when the tragedy struck. However, the exact cause of the massive fire is not known.

President Droupadi Murmu, Vice President Jagdeep Dhankhar and Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed grief over the incident. Modi spoke to Gujarat Chief Minister Bhupendra Patel to enquire about the rescue and relief efforts. The CM has announced an ex gratia of ₹4 lakh to the kin of each of the deceased and ₹50,000 to each injured.

Google Maps leads tourists into swollen stream

Kottayam, May 25: Using Google Maps to navigate resulted in a tourist group from Hyderabad driving into a stream swollen with water near Kuruppanthara in this south Kerala district, police said Saturday.

The incident occurred late Friday night when the four-member group, including a woman, were going towards Alappuzha. The road they were travelling on was covered by water overflowing from the stream due to heavy rains and since the tourists were unfamiliar with the area, they drove right into the water body while navigating using Google maps, police said.

All four managed to escape unharmed due to the efforts of a nearby police patrolling unit and local residents, but their vehicle was completely



submerged under the water, an officer of Kaduthuruthy police station said.

The vehicle - a Ford Endeavour - was later pulled out of the stream using a crane. Thereafter, the man who was driving the vehicle told reporters that he and his friends were going to Alappuzha from Munnar and they took the route shown by Google maps.


"At around 2-3 pm, it started raining very heavily. The road was waterlogged. I was going very slow at around 10 kms per hour. But, suddenly the front tyres went deep into the water and the vehicle lost control.

'Then the rear tyres also went in and the vehicle started floating forward. We quickly pulled down the windows and jumped out. We somehow managed to safely reach the shore," he said.

Meanwhile, residents of the area said such accidents happen there during the rainy season when the road gets submerged.

This is not the first such Google

map-related accident reported in Kerala. In October last year, two young doctors died in a car accident which occurred after they allegedly followed directions on Google Maps and fell into a river. Following the incident, the Kerala police had issued cautionary guidelines for using the technology during the monsoon season.


'OTT helped me break barriers'

In an interview, she said, "During and after the pandemic, OTT changed everything for writers, directors, newcomers, and even for actors like Manoj Bajpayee and Vijay Varma, who were known names, but their potential wasn't fully tapped. In my case, I could have never imagined playing an undercover cop in a typical Bollywood film, but web films like Silence 1 and Silence 2 gave me the opportunity to break barriers and do something different. OTT was a breather for actors who had to wait endlessly for films to be financed and eventually released in theatres.

All We Imagine as Light wins Grand Prix award

Cannes, May 25: Filmmaker Payal Kapadia Saturday scripted history as her spellbinding

drama All We Imagine as Light won the Grand Prix award at the 2024 Cannes Film Festival.

The film bagged the award, which is the second-most prestigious prize of the festival after the Palme d'Or, during the closing ceremony of the 77th edition.

Kapadia's feature directorial

debut, which screened Thursday night and has received glowing reviews in the international press, already registered its name in the history books after it became the first Indian film in 30 years and first ever by an Indian female director to be showcased in the main competition.

The screening of the film received an eight-minute standing ovation from the audience members.

All We Imagine as Light, a Malayalam-Hindi feature, is about Prabha, a nurse, who receives an unexpected gift from her

long estranged husband that throws her life into disarray Her younger roommate, Anu, tries in vain to find a private spot in the big city to be alone with her

boyfriend. One day the two nurses go on a road trip to a beach town where the mystical forest becomes a space for their dreams to manifest, according to the plotline.







Bhubaneswar, May 25: The 2024 general elections which started from April 19 have 1.85 crore young electorates in the age group of 18-19 years who are casting vote for the first time. In Odisha, 7.54 lakh are in the same age group whose votes are going to play a crucial role in determining the fate of the candidates in the fray.

Orissa POST spoke to some of the young electorates in Bhubaneswar and Cuttack who exercised their franchise for the first time during the third phase of simultaneous elections, Saturday.

Resentment over mobile phone ban

Several voters in the state Saturday expressed strong resentment over the decision to ban mobile phones inside polling booths while exercising their franchise. The CEO's office has also banned smartwatches inside the booths. Those carrying mobile phones said there was no prior information from the Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) about the restriction on bringing mobile phones inside polling booths. They also noted there were no proper arrangements for the safe deposit of mobile phones near the polling booths. Several voters returned home without exercising their franchise because security personnel deployed at the booths did not allow them to enter with mobile phones. The CEO's office later issued a statement clarifying that only the Presiding Officer of a polling booth is allowed to carry a mobile phone, while voters and polling agents are barred from bringing mobile phones inside the polling booths.




























Heatwave sweeps India; 50°C in Phalodi Veterans: Sea change in AGENCIES New Delhi, May 25: Thousands of voters faced Thousands of horizontal and vertical concre-

Temperatures soared to a searing 50 degrees Celsius in Rajasthan's Phalodi Sunday, as a brutal heatwave swept through large parts of India, testing the endurance of millions, including those who stepped out to vote in the sixth phase of the ongoing general elections.

According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), 50 degrees Celsius is the highest temperature recorded in the country since June 1, 2019. when Churu, also in Rajasthan, logged a scorching 50.8 degrees

Phalodi hit India's all-time high temperature of 51 degrees Celsius May 19, 2016.

The extreme heat affected not only the northern plains and central regions of the country but also the hills of Himachal Pradesh, Assam and Arunachal Pradesh.

Thousands of voters faced scorching temperatures as they stepped out to vote in the sixth phase of the Lok Sabha elections, held in 58 seats across eight states and Union Territories, including Uttar Pradesh, Haryana, and the national capital

Many stood in long queues without shade for extended periods. In some places, polling booths lacked water, coolers, and chairs for the elderly, exacer-

bating the impact of the heat. Some voters even fainted due to the extreme heat and hot winds in Delhi, where temperatures exceeded 45 degrees Celsius in

six locations. West Bengal's Cooch Behar



across eight states and Union Territories (40.5 degrees), Assam's Silchar (40), and Lumding (43), and Arunachal Pradesh's Itanagar (40.5) and Pasighat (39.6) recorded their all-time high temperatures.

Assam's Tezpur (39.5), Mazbat (38.6), Dhubri (38.2), North Lakhimpur (39.2), and Mohanbari (38.8) also saw record-breaking temperatures for May. Official data showed that at

least 17 places in Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat and Madhya Pradesh recorded maximum temperatures of 45 degrees Celsius or above Saturday.

In Rajasthan, temperatures soared to 48.8 degrees Celsius in Barmer, 48 degrees in Jaisalmer, and 47.2 degrees in Bikaner, prompting the state's disaster management department to direct district collectors to make necessary arrangements to provide relief to people, animals, and birds from the heat.

The extreme heat will continue in parts of Delhi, Rajasthan, Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, Chhattisgarh, and Maharashtra until May 29. The searing heat will also affect the hills of Himachal Pradesh, Assam, and Meghalaya

A 'red' warning has been issued for Rajasthan, Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh, Delhi, west Uttar Pradesh, and Gujarat, indicating a 'very high likelihood' of heat illness and heatstroke for all age

The IMD said warm night conditions could further exacerbate heat-related stress in Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Haryana, Delhi, and Rajasthan over the next four days. High night temperatures are particularly dangerous because the body doesn't get a chance to cool down. Increasing nighttime heat is more common in cities due to the urban heat island effect, where metro areas are significantly hotter than their

surroundings Akash Vashishtha, foundersecretary of the Society for Protection of Environment and Biodiversity, said that urban regions like Delhi-NCR become heat chambers due to land and surface concretisation, causing

a heat multiplier effect. The severe heat wave conditions in Delhi-NCR are not just typical weather for this time of the year but the consequences of extensively concretised land surfaces creating 'urban heat islands', which amplify the trapped heat in the lower atmosphere.

Incoming solar radiation, once reflected from the land surface, lacks open space to escape to

tised structures, significantly raising ambient temperatures, he said. Vashishtha said immediate

steps are needed to keep ground surfaces vegetated to absorb solar radiation and reduce heat reflection and radiation from land surfaces. The punishing heat in India is

straining power grids and drying up water bodies, triggering drought-like conditions in parts of the country.

According to the Central Water Commission, water storage in 150 major reservoirs in India plunged to its lowest level in five years last week, exacerbating water shortages in many states and significantly affecting hydropower

generation. Water levels in the Delhi stretch of the Yamuna river have dropped amid the sweltering heat, affecting water supply. The city also saw power demand reach a record 8,000 megawatts on Wednesday, with air conditioners, coolers, and refrigerators in homes and offices running at full capacity.

Severe and frequent heatwaves are further burdening low-income households, which often have poor access to water and cooling, and testing the endurance of outdoor workers toiling in the searing sun, forcing them to take frequent breaks.

Anna Walnycki of the Londonbased International Institute for **Environment and Development** said. "Low-income households have limited capacity to adapt to extreme heat because of poor access to water and electricity."

"We must celebrate the elections by participating in it. That is possible only with vot-

ing," he said. Panda, who lives with his son and the latter's family, said, 'The new generation must also vote like the elders because without voting you can't expect

the change you want.' His son Nrusingha Charan Panda, who has voted for more than five times so far, said elections have changed consider-



ably in last many years, and have become more technology-

A new question paper and OMR sheet, the petitioner said, was provided to her after a delay of around 30 minutes but she was given only 10 extra minutes to complete her examination.

The petition alleged that she suffered due to NTA's conduct as she was denied a fresh OMR sheet for around 30 minutes and was finally provided with a fresh OMR sheet and question paper after an "unreasonable delay".

She claimed that she had already attempted 60 questions in the old question paper and could not attempt all questions in the new question paper properly with focus and concentration. "Petitioner is severely prejpetition said. "In light of the foregoing facts and circumstances it is most respectfully prayed that this Hon'ble Court may be pleased to... Constantly tuned in to child's every need not always ideal

't's crucial for healthy child development that children can form secure attachment bonds with their parents. Decades of research identified one key ingredient for this process: the coordination of parents' and children's brains and behaviour during social inter-

Brain-to-brain synchrony between parent and child can be helpful for children's attachment, and tends to rise when a parent and child play, talk or solve problems together: Recently, however, we started wondering whether more synchrony is always better.

Is current parenting advice up to date?

A lot of current parenting advice recommends parents to be constantly 'in sync' with their kids. It tells parents to be physically close and attuned to their children and to anticipate and immediately respond to their every

The advice is building upon at-

tachment theory and research, which show that higher parental sensitivity and reflective functioning are beneficial for child development and secure attachment formation.

Yet, despite its good inten-

tions, this advice misses several important details. For example, research revealed that for about 50-70 per cent of the time, parents and children are not 'in sync'. During these times, they may be doing separate activities, such as a child exploring something on their own or a parent working. They rather engage in a constant 'social dance' comprising being attuned to each other, failing to do so and repairing this disconnect.

And it's this flow of connection, disconnection and reconnection that offers children an ideal mixture of parental support and moderate, useful stress that helps growing children's social

Researchers agree that there can be negative consequences

to parents and children constantly being tuned in to each other. For example, it can increase stress on the relationship and raise the risk for insecure child attachment. That is especially true if it is associated with parents overstimulating their child or being too responsive to their child's every need.

there thus appears to be an "optimal midrange". Or, in other words, more synchrony may not necessarily be better.

Brain-to-brain synchrony and attachment

In mother-child pairs, neural synchrony was linked to taking turns in solving puzzles or conversations. And in father-child pairs, synchrony during puzzling was linked to dads being confident about and enjoying their role as fathers. But does that mean higher parent-child neural synchrony is always a measure of a good relationship?

The findings suggest that higher neural synchrony may be the result of putting increased cognitive effort into the parentchild interaction. If mothers' attachment representations are insecure, it may be more difficult for mums and kids to coordinate and help each other during activities such as puzzle solving.

A similar explanation may apply to neural synchrony during father-child problem-solving. Dads are more familiar with active, rough-and-tumble play. Engaging in structured and cognitively demanding activities such as puzzles may therefore be more challenging and require more neural synchrony for father-child pairs.

Lessons to be learned Most importantly, parents should not feel that they must be "in sync" with their kids all the time and at all costs. High parent-child attunement can also reflect interaction difficulties and can often add up to parental burnout, further negatively impacting the parent-child rela-

tionship. It is of course helpful if parents are emotionally available, skilled in reading their children's cues and promptly and sensitively respond to their needs.

Children can also benefit from freedom and independence emotionally, socially and cognitively, especially as they get older.

What really counts is that the parent-child relationship functions well overall. Those children can develop trust in their parents and that any mismatches, which naturally occur all the time, are successfully repaired. That's the true essence of attachment theory, which is often missed and misrepresented in

parenting advice.

Once perennial, Gobari awaits revival

THE RIVER IS NOW LYING BURIED FOR A **STRETCH OF 16 KM FROM PATTAMUNDAI TO GANDAKIA LEADING TO RAMPANT ENCROACHMENT OF** THE WATER BODY

Pattamundai, May 25: Gobari river, which was the lifeline of Kendrapara district once upon a time, is inching towards extinction and urgently awaiting revival. What is left of the Gobari river now is only a grim reminder of its glorious past, gasping for survival.

There was a time when the Gobari river used to be a blessing for the farmers as it irrigated all the farmlands in nine panchayats. Farmers in these panchayats used to reap a bumper harvest by cultivating various vegetables and paddy during the Rabi season on their farmlands.

The river had a deep connection with the life and livelihood of people. People used to finish their daily chores in the river, used its water for drinking and irrigating their farmlands. This had brought a rare distinction for the river as it came to be known as the lifeline of residents in Kendrapara district.

However, with change in time, the river which flows through five panchayats of Pattamundai block and Pattamundai Municipality area, has now gone out of shape as it has been buried with wild grass and weed at various places. This is because people in the local market and villages are dumping all sorts of wastes in the river. This has angered the residents as the state government is not making any serious effort for its revival.

Originating from the perennial Brahmani river, the river flowed for over 30 km and finally merged with Bay of Bengal. Decades back, Gobari was also a perennial river like Brahmani and helped in transportation of goods

and passengers on boats.

However, bad days arrived for Gobari when the connecting channel of Gobari and Brahmani rivers was blocked during the construction of Cuttack-Chandbali road in 1860. This hindered free flow of water into Gobari river which aided deposition of silt in the river.

Meanwhile, the river is now lying buried for a stretch of 16 km from Pattamundai to Gandakia. This has led some unscrupulous persons to encroach on the water body and construct houses on the riverbed.

As a result, thousands of acres of farmland on both sides of the river are now lying uncultivated due to lack of irrigation. This has severely affected the social and economic growth of people.

The attraction for agriculture among the people began to wane

as people migrated to other states in search of livelihood.

The river has now lost its identity due to lack of awareness among the riparian villagers and apathetic attitude of the departmental authorities. The state government and the district administration are aware of the situation but have yet to take any step in this regard. A few vears back, efforts were made for its restoration but soon the project was abandoned.

Farmers in the district are demanding for revival of the river but their pleas are yet to be addressed.

When contacted, drainage engineer Nihar Routray said the higher authorities have been apprised of the issue and work for the revival of the river will start after receiving the approval from the concerned authorities.

Child dies, mother critical in accident

Rourkela, May 25: A sixmonth-old girl child died and her mother was rendered critical after the two-wheeler they were travelling on was hit by a speeding truck Friday evening in Sundargarh district. The condition of the woman admitted to VIMSAR at Burla is stated to be out of danger.

As per information, one Muni Pradhan was coming to Sundargarh from Bargaon on a scooter. Muni's sister was driving the scooter, who survived the accident with minor injuries A speeding truck hit the scooter near Karamdihi and fled from the scene

The girl child, Sreyansi, was thrown out of her mother's lap up to 20 metre distance and reportedly died on the spot. The two women along with the baby were soon shifted to Sundargarh where the doctors pronounced the child dead. As the condition of Muni turned serious, she was soon shifted to VIMSAR in Burla, where her condition was reported to be out of danger.

In the last six months, 18 persons have lost their lives and over 30 have been left in different stages of injuries in the district. Another disturbing fact has also come to fore that during the last five months, 21 persons have lost their lives due to various kinds of accidents. This number was 24 last year between January to August.



Bridge across Deo river remains a non-starter

Rourkela, May 25: The bridge planned to be built across the Deo river here is a classic example of the government agencies' apathetic attitude towards public causes. The said bridge is regarded as a game changer in the offing for the area like the Jhirpani bridge, which is located just 300 metre away.

But for the compensation of just 52 decimal land, the entire bridge work is in suspended animation. According to sources the sanctioned fund worth over ₹1 crore is already with the administration.

In 2018, it was decided that a bridge will be built over the Deo river, a tributary of Koel, to connect the Mitkundri and Lahanda areas. Despite being a small river, it is an important water body as it is the lifeline for a large tract of land and also the people residing there. The bridge was a long-standing plan so that connectivity will be improved in some of the most fertile patches of land here.

Had the administration given the compensation to the land owners, the bridge work, which has been holding fire, would have got a push. The administration had promised that they would complete this process by March 10. However, work is yet to start even as it's already the end of May.

The villagers had staged a demonstration for over a month near the construction site last October. Following the demonstration which was supported by political leaders of all hues, little concern was showed by the administration. The land owners were invited to Sundargarh and were assured that all their dues would be given by March 10. The dates for the general elections were declared March 17 and the model code of conduct came into effect.

Now the land owners have threatened that they would not allow any construction activity. Interestingly, the land belonging legally to Durga Oram is only 52 decimal, which would have been compensated, as per the promise of the administration, over two months back before the MCC came into force.

The work on the bridge began in 2019 for which the tender process and award of work was over in 2018. During the pandemic in 2020, the work was completely stopped and again started in August 2021. So far, five pillars have been erected and the slabs have been laid on four. Only one pillar is left on which the slab would be laid, which is on the Lahanda side where work has been stopped owing to the compensation issue.

Minor girl drowns in pond

Basudevpur, May 25: In a tragic incident, a 12year-old girl drowned in a pond at Balinagar village in Ward No. 10 under this municipality in Bhadrak district Saturday.

The deceased was identified as Mamuni Mallik, daughter of Sania Mallik, a resident of Balinagar

As per reports, Mamuni had gone to the pond for a bath. However, while bathing in the pond her foot slipped and she fell into the deep water. She was later rescued in an unconscious state and rushed to Basudevpur hospital, where the doctors declared her 'brought dead'. A pall of gloom descended on the village after the news spread.

Vague Ideology

he Bharatiya Janata Party is India's largest political force but its ideology is not properly understood. Some aspects of it—the opposition to dynasty, the promise of economic development are clear, even though these may not be adhered to by the party fully. The largest component of the ideology, what is called Hindutva or Hindu nationalism, is more vague. What does it mean and what is it intended to achieve?

Devanura Mahadeva, a famous writer from Karnataka, explores this with his work on the parent body of the BJP. In the book titled 'RSS: The Long and Short of It', Mahadeva attempts to understand what the RSS is and what it wants through the simple device of reading Hindutva's primary texts. These are VD Savarkar's works and MS Golwalkar's Bunch of Thoughts. The writer describes of his motivation to do this through a parable. A sorcerer who spread turmoil was invincible because his life was stored in a parrot in a distant cave. He thus remained untouched by action against his own person. The only way to get at him was to go after this life-soul, in that hidden parrot. Mahadeva thus goes on this quest to see what lies behind Hindutva.

In his encounter with Golwalkar, he finds that the RSS head worshipped

caste and asked that the rest of us worship it. In 'Bunch of Thoughts', Golwalkar says that the Hindu people are his god and this god manifests itself through caste. Meaning the organisation of Hindu society in the way Manu described it (Brahmin head, Kshatriya arms, Vaishya thighs and Shudra feet) is the entity that is worthy of worship. In 1960, Golwalkar said that caste could be used for cross-breeding superior humans, like it was done in animals. This was done by Hindus earlier, through upper caste men fathering the first child of a woman married to someone else. It may interest readers to know that Europe in the feudal period may have had something similar called droit du seigneur ('right of the lord'), allowing feudal lords to have sexual relations with subordinate women on the wedding nights of the women. That this is straight exploitation of the weak and not some noble thing does not appear to have occurred to Golwalkar.

If such things are not pushed forth by the RSS cadre or the BJP it is not because these statements have been withdrawn but because they are likely confident that few people will do what the author has done and actually read the primary texts. It would be interesting to see a television debate recently around whether or not the caste system should be worshipped and ossified as the

Mahadeva makes a number of original observations. He says that the RSS has defanged the religions that sprang out of India but rejected the caste that he wants worshipped. "The RSS tries to pull out the teeth

and nails of Jaina, Bouddha, Sikh, Lingayat and other dharmas that were born in India and rejected the Chaturvarna order". By merely saying that these are Hindu faiths, it is sought to subsume them.

There is no resistance to this internally, he writes, because the RSS in fact does not encourage thinking. Of the title 'Bunch of Thoughts' itself he says that there is not much thinking in the work, only a series of "random, dangerous beliefs and that too from a bygone age." Thinking is discouraged in the RSS through the insistence on order over diversity. The RSS 'tames' its volunteers, Mahadeva writes and quotes Golwalkar as saying that they must "do what is told... if told to play kabaddi play kabaddi, told to hold meeting then meeting... their discretion is not required."

Among the things that this cadre is taught is that the constitution flawed. The very idea of states is offensive to them, because there can be only one Bharat Mata and the existence of a Karnataka, Gujarat or Bengal is wrong. The stress for homogeneity over diversity shows, the author writes, in such things as nomenclature. The RSS and the BJP refer to Adivasis as 'vanvasis' (forest dwellers), this eroding their in-

Mahadeva calls Hindutva a 'cow-faced tiger', an entity that is eating at Indian society from within. The prime minister he says is popular but is only an "utsava murti", an replica of a idol that is led out at a procession. "The real deity sits in Nagpur, inside the RSS shrine." The only qualifications required of the utsava murti are the ability to put up a show and mesmerise the people. Mahadeva asks "don't we see all of this today?"

What does he offer as a solution? He gives the example of a village that is overrun by thieves.

"Firstly, the entire town wakes up. At night the youth take turns patrolling and keeping watch in the mohallas. Women carry chilli powder with them. This is the kind of this awakening and vigil we all need. Because these thieves can come in different guises; they may come for temple maintenance for instance. Fake news can be spread. Hymn singing can be organised. The only way out is to first uncover the plot. This requires us to be vigilant. Further, at least now, the sane voices which are a scattered few need to speak up about right and wrong. Words like love, tolerance, justice need to be heard from within our society.'

The intellectual content of books is sometimes judged by how long they are. Mahadeva himself refers to his work as a 'booklet'. Let this description not mislead the potential reader. This is a first rate work which is the most important intellectual attack on the times we are going through, and for that reason has also become the most popular.

HISTORICALLY, **NO COUNTRY HAS MANAGED TO ACHIEVE 4% GROWTH IN THE SUBSEQUENT 12 YEARS AFTER** THE ELDERLY **MADE UP 15% OF THE POPULATION**

n March, Chinese Premier Li Qiang announced an ambitious economic growth target of 5% for 2024. In a subsequent commentary, former World Bank chief economist Justin Yifu Lin endorsed the government's target, predicting that China's economy will grow at an average annual rate of 5-6% over the coming decade before slowing to 3-4% between 2036 and 2050. Lin also suggested that China could achieve highincome status in 2026, if not 2025. Given China's bleak demographic outlook, this seems highly unlikely.

Lin notes that 26 countries had less than half of the United States' GDP per capita when their populations began to age. He argues that since these countries continued to improve their economies after this point, China can, too. The WHO defines the start of an economy's aging phase as the point where the share of those aged 65 and older exceeds 7% – a demographic milestone China reached in 1998. By 2023, the share of Chinese people over 65 increased to 15.4%. Historically, no country has managed to achieve 4% growth in the subsequent 12 years after the elderly made up 15% of the population. The average growth rate for high-income countries during this period is just 1.8%.

An aging population affects production, consumption, entrepreneurship, and innovation, eroding economic dynamism. As the median age and the share of people aged 65 and older increase, GDP growth slows. Consequently, Lin's prediction that China will achieve an annual growth rate of 5-6%between 2024 and 2035 is as improbable as an 80-year-old winning a marathon.

Lin emphasizes China's latecomer advantage, but this is offset by its rapidly aging population. Demographic problems and shrinking labor forces have caused GDP per capita in Spain,

Greece, and Portugal, respectively, to fall from 73%, 66%, and 51% of the US level in 2008 to 39%, 27%, and 32%. Along with other aging societies such as South Korea and Taiwan, these countries are now at risk of falling back into the middleincome trap.

China's aging crisis is reminiscent of what happened in Japan and Germany, whose labor forces began to shrink in the mid-1990s. By 2023, Japan and Germany's GDP per capita had fallen to 41% and 64% of the US level, respectively, from 154% and 110% in 1995.

Similarly, China's median age in 2023 was the same as Japan's in 1995 and Germany's in 2000, while the share of people aged 65 and older matched Japan's in 1996 and Germany's in 1995. Over the 12 years that followed these demographic milestones, Japan's average annual growth rate was 0.8%, and Germany's was 1.4-1.5%. Based on these historical trends, China's growth rate is likely to slow to 3% by 2028 and fall below that of the US from 2031 to 2035.

China's GDP per capita reached \$12,681 in 2023, falling short of the World Bank's highincome threshold of \$13,845. With an average annual increase of 2.1% over the past two decades, the threshold is projected to rise to \$15,715 by 2028 and \$18,219 by 2035. Assuming that China's per capita GDP growth slows from 5% in 2024 to 3% in 2028 and 1.5% in 2035, its GDP per capita is expected to reach \$17,893 over the next decade. The widening economic gap between China and the US will further impede China's ability to cross the high-income threshold.

Moreover, several factors are expected to put downward pressure on the renminbi, complicating China's efforts to escape the middle-income trap. First, China's labor force is shrinking rapidly, and its industrial value chain is shifting to countries participating in the government's Belt and Road Initiative. Western countries' attempts to reduce their dependency on Chinese supply chains could further weaken China's manufacturing sector, eroding the country's trade surplus.

Second, as economic growth slows and local governments grapple with an escalating debt crisis, Chinese interest rates

Lastly, low fertility rates around the world could lead to low inflation and even outright deflation. China's persistently low fertility rate, combined with insufficient domestic demand and excess capacity, is likely to intensify deflationary pressures, widening the interest-rate gap between the renminbi and the US dollar.

To be sure, if the high-income threshold were to remain un changed, China might manage to reach it. But its aging population would likely prevent it from escaping the real middleincome trap. The country's household disposable income accounts for only 42% of its GDP, well below the global average of 60-70%. The 2022 highincome threshold translates to per capita disposable income of \$8,307-\$9,692, typically indicative of a large middle class capable of exerting pressure

on the government. By contrast, China's per capita disposable income was just \$5,565 in 2023, and its middle class remains a minority. To cross the high-income threshold, China would need to boost its GDP per capita to \$19,000-22,000. But achieving this requires farreaching reforms.

Above all, China must raise household disposable incomes and tackle its demographic crisis, both of which require a political and economic overhaul. Given that China today is even more averse to economic reforms than it was when Deng Xiaoping launched his marketoriented reforms in 1978, rapid change is highly unlikely. The required transformation may take several decades, if not longer.

Manipur ethnic rift splinters sporting dreams

HOTBED OF INDIAN SPORT. SENDING A STREAM OF ATHLETES TO THE OLYMPICS **AND OTHER** INTERNATIONAL **COMPETITIONS**

Bangalore, May 25: Ethnic clashes in Manipur saw its most successful women's club fail to field a team in the Indian Women's League in 2023-24, with its coach fleeing his burning home and a number of players in self-imposed exile interstate.

The unrest in the northeastern state, which has resulted in more than 200 dead and tens of thousands displaced, divided football teams like Eastern Sporting Union (ESU) along ethnic lines and forced some players out of the state.

"At first we didn't think it would be that bad, but suddenly it was everywhere," former ESU skipper Irom Prameshwori Devi, who has since joined East Bengal, told Reuters of the outbreak of violence. "We had five Kuki players in the team ... they were scared because Kukis were being attacked on the streets of Imphal. We were trying to assure them it would be fine, but houses were being burned by then," she said.

Violence erupted in Manipur May 3, last year between the majority Meitei and minority Kuki communities over the potential sharing of economic benefits and quotas in government jobs



As warring groups set fire to each other's homes and places of worship, football teams in the capital Imphal also found themselves splintered.

ESU coach Ngampao Kipgen, a member of the Kuki tribe, told Reuters he was forced to flee to the hills with his family after his house was burned

"They came in the middle of the night. I had to leave with my wife and children," Ngampao said. "I have no team here, no income. I am helpless," he added.

According to official figures released in February, Ngampao's house was one of more than 13,000 structures destroyed during the violence.

ESU manager Homendro Irengbam said the conflict, which broke out while the team was playing in the IWL in the western state of Gujarat, drove a wedge between players.

'Our Kuki players were staying with Meitei roommates but once the conflict started, they wanted to stick together," he said. Match preparation, team meetings, everything was disturbed. That was reflected on the field, he said.

The team tried to put on a united front, Devi said, but finished fourth in the group stage before crashing out in the semifinals of the 2022-23 competition, a contest they had won in the inaugural 2016-17 season.

When the tournament ended the manager urged his players not to return to Manipur.

"If you go back, you'll become village defence volunteers. You'll stop playing football and join the war," Irengbam said he told

But ESU can no longer afford to play in the national Indian Women's League after community contributions dried up due to the conflict. "Unfortunately, we were not able to even pay some of the players," Irengbam said.

Midfielder Lhingneilam Kipgen, one of ESU's Kuki players, said she had not returned to Manipur due to the violence and joined Delhi-based Garwhal United, but still missed her old

"I hope ESU come back. When things are better I want to join again," she said.

The unrest also prevented Kuki players reporting for preseason training for Imphal-based NEROCA and TRAU, the two higgest men's soccer teams in the state. Both teams have since been relegated from India's second tier after playing the 2023-24 season in exile.

"The mental trauma is still there for all the players. We are participating against all odds," TRAU general secretary Phulen Meitei said.

"Our own people are being killed ... football is less important than life," he said.

1,430 Myanmarese nationals took shelter in Mizoram in last 10 days

Aizawl, May 25: A total of 1,430 Myanmarese nationals took shelter in the northeastern state of Mizoram in the last 10 days amid fresh clashes in the neighbouring country between the army and 'pro-democratic forces', an official said Saturday.

According to an official, at least 40 Myanmarese nationals crossed the India-Myanmar forested border Friday and Saturday. They took shelter in Mizoram's Saitual and Champhai

Villagers of the two districts are providing food and shelter to the refugees, sources said.

According to a Mizoram gov ernment official, the refugees, mostly belonging to Myanmar's Chin state, fled to different villages of Mizoram due to fear triggered by the armed clashes between 'Tatmadaw' (Myanmar military) and pro-democratic forces led by the Chin National Army.

Villagers claimed the migrants



also feared air raids by the country's air force.

District officials, meanwhile, have been collecting the details of the Myanmarese nationals. Meanwhile, opposition Mizo

National Front (MNF) leader TC Pachhunga said that despite continuous demands, the Centre has not yet provided any assistance to the Mizoram government to provide relief to the refugees from Myanmar, Bangladesh and internally displaced people from Manipur.

Addressing a party meeting at the MNF office here, Pachhunga said the Central government, pects, must provide financial and other support.

He said that the previous MNF government on several occasions had urged the Central government to provide funds to take care of the migrants from Myanmar, Bangladesh and

As per the government records. the total number of refugees February 2021 has risen to around 36,000.

Most refugees stay in rented accommodation and the homes of their relatives or friends, while others live in 149 relief camps across seven districts of the state. The Myanmarese who took

shelter in Mizoram are mostly from the Chin community, who share ethnic, cultural and traditional ties with the Mizos.

NE states likely to witness moderate to very heavy rain

Agriculture produces in 66.89 hectares of land have been destroyed in Thiruvananthapuram and as many as 720 farmers suffered losses from May 22 to 24 here, they said.

Four houses have been completely destroyed and 41 were partially damaged due to torrential downpour in the district where several families were shifted to relief camps in the past few days.

Meanwhile, the IMD sounded a yellow alert in seven districts of the state, including Thiruvananthapuram, Kollam, Pathanamthitta, Alappuzha, Idukki, Kottayam and Ernakulam.

A yellow alert indicates heavy rainfall between 6cm and 11cm. The weather department predicted isolated heavy rain in these districts in the coming hours. As per the latest update of the Indian National Center for Ocean Information Services (IN-COIS), high waves ranging from 0.5 to 3.1 metres and sea incursions are predicted along the coast of Kerala from southern Vizhiniam to northern Kasaragod until Saturday night.

In view of the warning, authorities have advised people not to venture into the sea and stay away from beaches.

Those who live on sea shore were asked to move to safer places if necessary as the chances of sea incursion were higher.

"An appeal to helpful and warm hearted people of Assam - In view of continuous high temperatures, it is requested that drinking water may please be provided to policemen and women deployed near your houses, offices, commercial & business establishments as long as the heat wave lasts," Singh posted on 'X'

The DGP said the police personnel have been advised to carry water bottles with them but "we would be grateful if these bottles are refilled as and when required. Assam Police shall always remain grateful"

He also posted pictures of senior officers distributing drinking water to policemen and women in Guwahati and complimented them for the initiative.

The DGP also posted pictures of people offering drinking water to travellers and Assam Police personnel in different parts of the state. The state has been reeling under a heatwave since the past few days with temperatures crossing 40 degrees Celsius in many districts.

School timings in various districts, including Kamrup (Metro), have been adjusted. Classes will now commence at 7.30am, concluding for lower primary schools by noon, middle schools by

12.30pm, and high schools by 1pm. District authorities have issued directives to conduct morning assemblies indoors or in shaded areas, ensuring electric fans are operational, and advising students not to wear blazers, waistcoats, and ties. Additionally, students who find wearing shoes uncomfortable are permitted to wear sandals during this period, the directive said.

Schools have also been instructed to promptly inform parents if students feel unwell andto seek medical assistance from the nearest hospital as necessary.

Over 61% turnout in 6th phase of LS polls

New Delhi, May 25: An estimated voter turnout of 61.46 per cent was recorded in the sixth phase of the Lok Sabha election Saturday in 58 constituencies across six states and two Union territories, with the polling percentage in the Jangal Mahal region of West Bengal touching 79.78.

Incidents of violence, including an alleged assault on a BJP candidate, minor clashes and protests were reported from West Bengal while there were instances of EVM malfunctioning at some places, including Delhi.

Jharkhand recorded a turnout of 63.76 per cent, Uttar Pradesh 54.03 per cent, Bihar 55.24 per cent, Jammu and Kashmir 54.46 per cent, Haryana 61.16 per cent, Odisha 70.23 and Delhi 57.82 per cent, according to the figures updated at 12:15 am by the EC on its voter turnout app.

The EC said polling percentage in the Anantnag-Rajouri seat in Jammu and Kashmir is the highest in 40 years.

The EC had directed election officials and state machineries to take adequate measures to manage the adverse impact of hot weather. Over 11.13 crore voters -5.84 crore male, 5.29 crore female and 5120 third gender - were eligible to exercise their franchise in this phase. The Election Commission (EC) deployed around 11.4 lakh polling offi-

Man held for posing as female professor to rape tribal girls

Sidhi, May 25: A 30-year-old man has been arrested in Madhya Pradesh's Sidhi district for allegedly raping at least seven girls after posing as a woman college teacher and calling them in connection with scholarship funds, police said Saturday.

Most of the survivors belong to tribal communities. Brajesh Prajapati, the accused, used a voice-changing app to sound like a woman while talking to his potential victims on phone, police said. Three associates of Prajapati have also been arrested, said Rewa Range Inspector General (IG) Mahendra Singh Sikarwar.

Prajapati called girl students while posing as a woman college teacher from a collage at Tikari, and asked them to meet so that they could get a scholarship, the police official said. 'Her son' will take them to her house, the caller would tell the girls. After the crime, he would snatch away the girl's mobile phone.

During the probe, police learnt that the culprit had marks of burns and injuries on his hands, and finally nabbed him.

While Prajapati confessed to raping seven girls, four girls have come forward to lodge complaints, IG Sikarwar said.

The first case of rape, kidnapping, assault and robbery was registered May 16 following an incident of May 13. Two more cases were registered May 18 and May 23 over crimes that had taken place May 4 and May 20, respectively. Another FIR was registered under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act May 19 over a crime that had taken place April 15, police officials said.

Pune car crash: Minor's grandfather arrested

Pune, May 25: Pune police Saturday arrested the grandfather of the 17-year-old involved in a car crash here that killed two persons while claiming that both the teenager's father and grandfather put pressure on the family's driver to take blame for accident by offering him money

and giving threats. "After the accident, the driver gave a statement at the Yerawada police station that he was at the wheel....But it was revealed that a teen

was driving the car," police commissioner Amitesh Kumar told reporters.

After the driver left the Yerawada police station, the teenager's father, realtor Vishal Agarwal and his grandfather whisked him in a car to his house on the premises of their bungalow, confiscated his phone and confined him there, the senior police official said.

"He was pressured to give a statement to police as per their directions," Kumar said, adding that the driver was offered gifts and cash for owning up the crash of the Porsche driven by the teenager, and also threatened.

The driver's wife reached the place the next day and freed him. said the commissioner.

'The driver was frightened. He was summoned and his statement was recorded Thursday (May 23). After corroboration of facts, an offence was registered against the juvenile's father and grandfather (on the driver's complaint)," Kumar said.

While seeking custody of the teenager's grandfather in the sessions court Saturday, the prosecution said the police had recovered DVR (digital video recorder) of CCTV footage from the house of the accused. and the probe indicated that the footage was tampered with.

The court was also informed about past offences registered against the grandfather at police stations in Kondhwa, Bundgarden in Pune and another at Mahabaleshwar in Maharashtra.

Parents of Anish Awadhiya and Ashwini Koshta, the 24-yearold techies from Madhya Pradesh who were killed in the accident, have demanded a Supreme Courtmonitored probe in the case.

Tribal woman sells newborn due to poverty

Agartala: A tribal woman from Tripura's Dhalai district, grappling with dire poverty following her husband's death five months ago, sold her newborn for ₹5,000, an official said Saturday. The four-day-old girl was fortunately rescued from a couple in Hezamara, West Tripura district, and reunited with her mother, following opposition leader Jitendra Choudhury's intervention, sources said. Mormati Tripura (39) of Taraban Colony in Gandacherra subdivision, gave birth to a daughter at home Wednesday. The next day she sold the child to a couple in Hezamara for ₹5,000, citing extreme poverty after her husband's demise five months ago, sub-divisional magistrate (SDM) Arindam Das said. "Already burdened with two sons and a daughter, she couldn't afford another child in the face of severe financial strain. This desperation likely led to the decision to sell the child. Upon receiving the alert, we swiftly retrieved the infant and reun her with her mother the following day," Das added.

3 Naxalites killed in separate encounters

Raipur/Bijapur: Three Naxalites were killed in encounters with security personnel in Chhattisgarh's south Bastar region Saturday, police said. Two Naxalites were gunned down in Bijapur district, while another was neutralised in neighbouring Sukma district, they said. In Bijapur, the gunfight occurred in a forest near Jappemarka-Kamkanar villages under the Mirtur police station limits, where a team of District Reserve Guard (DRG) was out on an anti-Naxalite operation, an official said. In another encounter, a Naxalite was killed by the security forces on a forested hill near Belpochcha village in Sukma district, Sukma Superintendent of Police Kiran Chavan told PTI. Maoists have called for a bandh on May 26 in the Bastar region to protest against the alleged fake encounters.

Judicial custody for Gupta brothers

New Delhi: South African businessmen Anil Kumar Gupta and Aiay Kumar Gupta. who were arrested by the police in Dehradun on charges of abetment of suicide of a prominent builder, were sent to judicial custody for 14 days Saturday. While sending the Gupta brothers to judicial custody, the SJM's court also sought a response from the police on the bail application moved by the accused. 

Peak power demand continues to rise

ndia's peak power demand hit the season's new high of 239.96 GW Friday, due to soaring mercury levels in various parts of the country, which compelled excessive use of cooling appliances like air conditioners and coolers. As per power ministry data, the peak power demand met or the highest supply in the day, was recorded at 239.96 GW Friday, which is the maximum so far in the summer season this year. On Thursday, it was 236.59 GW, while Wednesday, the peak power demand was at 235.06 GW, as per power ministry data. The all-time high peak power demand of 243.27 GW was recorded in September 2023. The record is expected to be broken during this summer season.

"Gujarat's foresight and supportive infrastructure and policies have attracted numerous large-scale projects," she said.

By the end of Q1 2024, India's

large-scale solar project pipeline stood at 143.3 GW, with an additional 93.1 GW of projects tendered and pending auction. The average cost of large-scale solar projects fell by 7 per cent QoQ and 28 per cent YoY, significantly improving the projects' internal rate of return.

"The reduction in the average cost of large-scale solar projects is largely attributed to the falling prices of solar modules,' added Priya Sanjay.

During the quarter, tenders totaling 30.7 GW were announced, up 122 per cent YoY and 92 per cent QoQ. Additionally, 25 GW of solar projects were auctioned, a 229 per cent QoQ increase and a 2,957 per cent YoY rise.

New Delhi, May 25: The income tax department has notified the Cost Inflation Index for the current fiscal beginning April 2024, for calculating longterm capital gains arising from sale of immovable property, securities and jewellery.

The Cost Inflation Index (CII) is used by taxpayers to compute gains arising out of sale of capital assets after adjusting infla-

The CII for financial year 2024-25, relevant to assessment year 2025-26, stood at 363, as per a notification of the Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT).

The CII number for last fiscal was 348 and for 2022-23 financial year it was 331.



Moore Singhi Executive Director Rajat Mohan said the CII reflects the inflation in the economy, which causes the prices of goods and services to increase over time. For the financial year 2023-24, the CII was set at 348.

The index for the following financial year, 2024-25, has been updated to 363, marking an increase of 15 points, which corresponds to an annual inflation rate of approximately 4.3 per

"This is consistent with the retail inflation rate of 4.83 per cent recorded in April 2024. Taxpayers usually prefer a higher CII as it allows them to claim larger tax rebates," Mohan said.

AKM Global Partner-Tax Sandeep Sehgal said the index is useful to adjust the capital gains for inflation, so that the taxpayers are taxed on real appreciation of the assets and not the gains due to inflation.

"Taxpayers can use this to calculate gains for long-term capital assets sold during FY 24-25 and reduce the tax liability accordingly." Sehgal said

CII is notified under the Income-tax Act, 1961 every year. It is popularly used to calculate "indexed cost of acquisition" while calculating capital gains at the time of sale of any capital asset.

The Pillar 1 negotiations are mainly aimed at reallocating the taxing right on US-based digital giants, allowing about \$200 billion of corporate profits to be taxed in the countries where the companies do business.

Bank of India (RBI) announced a record ₹2.11 trillion dividend transfer to the government, more than double New Delhi's and street estimates, leading to a decline in bond yields and a rise in equity markets. The surplus fund can help the new government, which

will take charge after the current elections, bring down its fiscal deficit by 0.3% of gross domestic product (GDP) or increase spending on infrastructure or "populist" stimulus, Citi Research's Samiran Chakraborty said.

'The bond markets would likely hope that the government follows the deficit reduction route, while the equity markets would likely prefer the government taking the expenditure increase one," said Chakraborty

During the election campaigns, the opposition Congress promised annual cash hand-

India's fiscal deficit ballooned to 9.2% during the pandemic but the government has steadily brought this down. But bringing down the deficit by 130 basis points from 5.8% in 2023/24 was seen as challenging and dependent on oneoff revenue from either privatisation or auction of telecom spectrum.

New Delhi, May 25: Billionaire Mukesh Ambani-promoted Reliance Industries has sought approval from fair trade regulator Competition Commission of India (CCI) for the \$8.5-billion merger of Viacom18 and Star India Pvt Ltd (SIPL).

"The proposed transaction aims to combine the entertainment businesses (along with certain other identified businesses) of Viacom18, part of Reliance Industries Ltd (RIL) group and SIPL, wholly-owned by The Walt Disney Company (TWDC). As a result of the transaction, SIPL, currently a wholly-owned entity of TWDC through its subsidiaries, will become a joint venture (JV) which will be jointly



held by RIL, Viacom18 and existing TWDC subsidiaries," a notice filed with the CCI said

The proposed transaction will not cause any appreciable adverse effect on competition in India, RIL said in the notice.

However, to facilitate the CCI's assessment, they have identified several key markets where horizontal overlaps were significant such as licensing of audio visual content rights, distribution of broadcast TV channels, provision of audio visual (AV) content, and supply of advertising space in India.

SIPL is engaged in a range of media activities, including TV broadcasting, motion pictures and operation of an OTT platform. It is a wholly-owned entity of US-based The Walt Disney Company (TWDC).

Viacom18 is engaged in the business of broadcasting of television (TV) channels, operation of an over-the-top (OTT) platform, in India and worldwide. It is also engaged in the business of production and distribution of motion pictures. In February this year, global

media giant Walt Disney Co and Reliance Industries announced signing of binding pacts to merge their media operations in India to create a ₹70,000 crore (\$8.5 billion) behemoth.

After the successful completion of the deal, it would create the biggest firm in the Indian media and entertainment sector, with over 100 channels in several languages, two leading OTT platforms and a viewer base of 750

million across the country. Reliance and its affiliates will hold 63.16 per cent stake in the combined entity, while Disney will have the remaining 36.84 per cent shareholding. Reliance has also agreed to invest around-₹11,500 crore into the joint venture to grow the OTT business.

Yecheon (South Korea), May 25: The Indian women's compound team of Jyothi Surekha Vennam, Parneet Kaur and Aditi Swami grabbed its third successive Archery World Cup gold medal, while the mixed team added a silver at the stage two event here Saturday.

The world number one Indian compound team dominated Turkey's Hazal Burun, Ayse Bera Suzer and Begum Yuva right from the first end and sealed the gold without dropping a set, maintaining a healthy six-point margin (232-226) in a lopsided final.

For Jyothi, Parneet and world champion Aditi, this completed a hat-trick of World Cup gold medals together. They won the season-opening World Cup Stage 1 in Shanghai, beating Italy last month. They also ended with a gold at the stage four of the event in Paris in August last year.

"It's unbelievable, we are consistent in our performance, but during the matches we just focus on shooting our best, so that we can get a medal for our team," Aditi said about their consistency.

Asian Games champion Jyothi, however, failed to add a second gold to her kitty as she along with Priyansh squandered an opening round lead to go down Sawyer Sullivan by two points (155-153) in the compound mixed team final. In the compound women's team final, the second seeded Indians began with three X (arrow near to the centre) and dropped one point each in the next three arrows to edge out their fifth seeded rivals by one point in the first round.

In the next round of six arrows, the Indians showed complete supremacy, drilling in five perfect 10s with two X, and one 9 to stretch their lead by four points at the halfway mark.

Turkey fought hard in the penultimate round, shooting four 10s with one X to match India's score of 58. But that did not matter much as the Indians were ahead by four points going into the fourth and final end.

They sealed it by scoring yet another 58, which was studded with three 10s and one X. "I was just thinking to shoot my best. I wanted to give my best even for the last arrow," said Jyothi.

"We are feeling really great that we won the team gold medal here, and the weather was a little bit windy, but we managed to shoot our best," Parneet said.

In a battle between the world's top-two ranked nations in the compound mixed team final, the USA made a remarkable comeback to win the gold and maintain their supremacy.
