State approves industrial projects worth ₹3,353cr

Bhubaneswar, Nov 8: The state government Friday gave its nod to 15 new industrial projects with a total investment of ₹3,353 crore, which is expected to generate 4,637 jobs.

The approvals came during a meeting of the State Level Single Window Clearance Authority, chaired by Chief Secretary Manoj Ahuja.

These projects cover a wide range of sectors, including chemical/renewable energy, steel, aluminium, food processing, manufacturing, textile & apparel, tourism, pharmaceuticals, and cement. They will be implemented across several districts. These projects reflect the state's continued focus on fostering a robust industrial landscape that promotes economic growth and employment generation in the state, said he Chief Secretary. MORE P3

A disconcerting report published by the New Delhi-based Centre for Science and Environment has said that India faced extreme weather on 255 out of the first 274 days of 2024, leading to over 3,200 human casualties, apart from causing severe damage to houses, crops and livestock. Madhya Pradesh experienced extreme weather on 176 days -- the most in the country. Kerala recorded the highest fatalities at 550, followed by Madhya Pradesh (353) and Assam (256). Andhra Pradesh had the most houses damaged (85,806), while Maharashtra, which saw extreme events on 142 days, accounted for over 60 per cent of the affected crop area nationwide, followed by

In February, the country recorded its second-highest minimum temperature in 123 years. May saw the fourth-highest mean temperature on record, and July, August, and September all registered their highest minimum temperatures since 1901.

In the northwest, January was the second driest, and July recorded the region's second-highest minimum tempera ture. The southern peninsula experienced its hottest February on record, followed by exceptionally hot and dry March and April, but with a 36.5 per cent surplus in July rainfall and the second-highest minimum temperature in August.

CSE Director General Sunita Narain said the record-breaking statistics reflect the impact of climate change, where events that used to occur once every century are now happening every five years or even less. "This frequency is overwhelming the most vulnerable populations, who lack the resources to adapt to this relentless cycle

of loss and damage," she said. According to the report, 1,376 people died due to floods, while lightning and storms claimed 1.021 lives.

Man detained for forced conversion bid on woman

Bhubaneswar, Nov 8: Odisha Police Friday detained a Kashmiri man after a woman filed a complaint that he forced her to undergo religious conversion and marry him, an officer said.

The man also allegedly threatened the woman of Jagatsinghpur district to upload video clips of their intimate moments on the internet.

The police registered a case at the Mahila Police Station here and sent the alleged victim to a hospital for medical examination.

The accused, Samir Mansoor, who claimed to be hailing from Bihar and presently staying in Kashmir, was nabbed while he was trying to leave from Odisha by train, the officer said. In the FIR, the woman claimed she came to know Mansoor through an online game in 2022 and was not aware of his religion initially.

"He forced me to convert and marry him. When I refused to convert, he made some of our intimate moments viral and blackmailed my father," the woman alleged in the FIR.

Men shouldn't tailor women's clothes, cut their hair: UP panel

Lucknow, Nov 8: Men should not take women's measurements at tailor shops, they should not cut a woman's hair or train her in the gym either these are some of the remedies proposed by the Uttar Pradesh State Women Commission to protect women and stymie the ill intentions of men.

The radical raft of suggestions, which also include installing CCTVs in gyms, cloth stores and coaching centres, and having a woman for security in school buses, followed a meeting held October 28.

The commission said it has sent letters on the guidelines -which aim at segregating men and women in public spaces -- to all district magistrates in the state to ensure compliance on the matter.

A functionary of the panel said this is just a proposal and it will subsequently request the state government to implement them by enacting a law.

"There have been increasing complaints of 'bad touch' by male trainers in gyms and in women's boutiques where tailors who take measurements are mostly male," Babita Chauhan, chairperson of the commission, told PTI.

"What we are saying is that it isn't a problem if the tailor is male but only women should take measurements," she said.

In a press note, the women's panel proposed that women's gyms and yoga centres should only have female trainers. The gym and the trainers should be verified, while CCTV and DVRs at the establishments should



mandatorily be in working

condition, it said. It said boutiques should have

a female tailor to take women's measurements for clothes, with a functioning CCTV at the store. Shops selling women's clothes are required to have female employees, it said.

It is mandatory to have a female dance teacher at drama centres and a female security guard or teacher in school buses, the guidelines added.

Chauhan said, "We are aware that trained women will have to be employed at all these places and this might take some time."

However, it would also help employ more women, she added. Himani Agarwal, a member of the commission, said the proposal floated by Chauhan October 28 was accepted by the panel.

Explaining the rationale behind the proposal, Agarwal told PTI the involvement of men in such professions can lead to women getting molested.

'They (men) try to indulge in bad touch. The intention of some of the men is also not good," she said, adding, "not that all men have bad intentions.

The proposal has drawn mixed reactions, with Samajwadi Party MLA Ragini Sonkar saying it should be left to individuals to decide which store or gym they want to go to.

"I don't think this is a justi-

fied decision as it should be an individual choice on whether one prefers a male or a female to attend to them. It is a matter of choice," said the MLA from Machhlishahr in Jaunpur dis-Madhu Garg, national joint

secretary of AIDWA (All India Democratic Women's Association), said, "This is not the correct thought process, and this is done by those people who are having a narrow-minded thought process. By doing so, the jobs of hundreds of people will be at risk of getting lost."

However, social workers Veena Sharma and Mohsina Choudhary welcomed the proposal, saying there are many complaints of women being harassed while giving measurements at tailor shops. They said that the proposal should be law.





15 new projects to create 4,637 jobs

Bhubaneswar, Nov 8: The 15 new industrial projects that received the state government's nod Friday are expected to create 4,637 employment opportunities, official sources said.

In the chemical/renewable energy sector, Reliance Bio Energy Limited will set up a compressed bio-gas and organic manure plant in Puri with an investment of ₹121.21 crore. The project is expected to create 69 jobs, officials said.

In the steel sector, Beekay Steel Industries Limited plans to invest ₹750 crore in Cuttack, expanding its operations with sponge iron, billets, ferro alloys, sinter plants, and a captive power plant. This expansion is expected to generate 800 jobs, they added.

The downstream aluminium sector will also see significant growth, with HM Power and Cables Private Limited setting up an aluminium conductor, power cable, and wire manufacturing plant in Jharsuguda. This ₹55.72 crore investment will create 205 jobs.



Asia Private Limited will set up a heating element manufacturing unit in Khurda, supported by an investment of ₹55.81 crore, which will create 132 jobs.

The food processing sector continues to attract significant investment, with several projects from companies like Bhuvaneshwari Foods and Beverages, Aban Beverages

ucts. These projects, located in Khurda, Bargarh, and Cuttack will have a combined investment of ₹1,542.04 crore and are expected to create over

1,358 jobs. In the textile and apparel sector, Odisha Textile Manufacturing Private Limited is establishing a facility in Khurda to manufacture recycled yarns from textile

create 535 jobs. In tourism, ITC Limited will expand its five-star hotel 'Welcomhotel' in Bhubaneswar with ₹119.14 crore invest-

Hope and skepticism: Odia diaspora reacts variedly over Trump's victory

Bhubaneswar, 8: Members of the Odia diaspora in the United States have reacted with skepticism and hope over the decisive victory of Republican candidate Donald Trump over his Democrat rival Kamala Harris in the just-concluded presidential elections.

The election sent the 78-year-old Trump to the White House, mak-

ing him the first former president to return to office in more than 130 years. He also became the oldest person ever elected to the role.

Speaking Orissa POST, Sadyasnata Pattanaik, a Chicago-based senior analyst, said, "I am very sad about the state of the country and the way in which we are going. I'm also scared for girls and women in my country. I'm still in shock. The American educa-

tion system is broken and the social fabric is torn at the moment." Sadvasnata said people in the US need to be prepared to witness some rollbacks in civil rights for women, the LGBTQ

community, immigrants

and other minorities after Trump assumes office. "I think we'll see a rise in inflation and prices of goods; fewer regulations leading to more and more food-related bacteria outbreaks and much more. Odia techie gets top award for 'Tinker on Wheels'

New Delhi, Nov 8: It's no ordinary village bus to ferry passengers. A veritable treasure chest of knowledge and fun, on Wheels' travels from school to school in rural areas and invites students on board to give them a hands-on experience of scientific activities such as robotics and 3D printing

The brainchild behind 'Tinker on Wheels' is a 28-year-old engineer from Odisha who was honoured this week with the third Rohini Nayyar Prize for Outstanding Contribution to Rural Development.

"I also had the IIT dream once upon a time and was heartbroken when I couldn't make it. I pursued my engineering from a government college in Odisha. When I began working as an engineer, I realised there is a huge gap in what is being taught in schools and what is actually happening in industry," Anil Pradhan told

"While students in metro cities still have exposure to handson-learning, it is very limited for students in rural areas and that is why I thought of starting this," said Pradhan.

He started with 200 students in 2017 and has helped 2.5 lakh students so far with his 'Tinker

school playground, where the minibus is parked and the play

area gets converted into a laboratory for the day giving them a chance to innovate and create

The schools where the bus goes are the ones which do not have infrastructure for offering hands-on learning to students. The unique project has

reached over 140 schools in Odisha, Tamil Nadu and Telangana, and has reached over 2.5 lakh students.

"Earlier, we used to identify such schools and would get in touch with them but now schools reach out them selves too. Depending upon the number of students at the school, mostly above Class V, we arrange the time span for visit of the bus. Sometimes it goes for a day, sometimes for more days, depending upon the strength. The idea is to give at least eight hours to each batch of students." Pradhan said.

He said the educators on the bus work with the school teachers to design activities for the students according to

get to conduct experiments, create things with 3D printing and innovate. They are also trained about cutting edge technologies like AI and Machine Learning, he said.

While schools which can afford to pay are charged a nominal fee of Rs 50-100 per child, the project also caters to schools which do not have a budget through CSR funding.

Pradhan who hails from Baral village in Odisha, said he no longer regrets not going to an IIT.

"The future is here, but our schools are lagging behind. Stuareas, are missing out on cutting-edge technology like AI, ML, IoT, robotics, space tech, 3D Printing and more. There is a significant skill gap in the technology sector. All this is a bigger challenge to solve and going to an IIT may have given me better exposure but not to my mission," Pradhan added.

"In this era of easily accessible data, children are not given for themselves. Model-making workshops, audio-visual presentations, role-playing activi ties and exploring the physical world help to deliver the message of classroom lessons in a more interesting and effective manner. By encouraging chil dren, we can train them to be independent and solve prob lems on their own, thus nurturing their confidence and self-belief," he said.

Pradhan was the chief de signer of Asia's first university rocket team, VSLV. His return to his rural roots in 2017 fuelled by his mission to bring hands on education to under served areas, led to the idea of Tinker on Wheels.

He also built a team of students from India that won world rank 3 at the NASA Rover Challenge in 2021, Asia's first Under-19 team to do so.

The Rohini Nayyar award instituted in memory of Rohini Nayyar, one of India's esteemed economists, is conferred annually in recognition of outstanding contributions to rural development.

The award, symbolising ex cellence and commitment to rural upliftment, comes with a cash prize of Rs 10 lakh, a citation and trophy, and is given annually by the Navvar Foun dation for Social and Economic Purpose to individuals below 40

Police nab woman, 2 sons in murder case

Kendrapara, Nov 8: Police have arrested three persons - a sexagenarian mother and her two sons - for their alleged involvement in a murder case in Kendrapara district.

Earlier, police had arrested four persons in this case. With the arrest of three more persons Thursday, the total number of arrests has gone up to seven, the IIC said.

All three were booked under various sections of the Indian Penal Code (IPC) including murder and common intention and produced before a court.

The court remanded them to jail custody after rejecting their bail pleas, the IIC said.

FISHING BAN IN FORCE

Challenges galore for turtle protection

Kendrapara, Nov 8: Even though the Forest department's seven-month long fishing ban to protect Olive Ridley turtles has come into force since November 1, the implementation of the restrictions is fraught with several challenges like lack of adequate patrol boats. staff crunch at marine police stations, poor communication with the Indian Coast Guard (ICG) personnel and, above all, mushrooming prawn gheries in Gahirmatha region.

Forest department officials said that they are prepared to ensure strict implementation of this fishing ban in the 20-km area of Gahirmatha, but conservationists and environmentalists are sceptical about the outcome as they highlighted several loopholes in enforcement of Indian Wildlife (Protection) Act of 1972 (Schedule I).

Lack of adequate patrol boats, staff shortage at marine police stations, poor communication with the ICG personnel, and mushrooming prawn gheries (shrimp farms) violating restrictions have raised serious doubts over the implementation of the ban and safety of the rare marine species.

Locals like Ganesh Chandra Samal, Jagannath Das, Dolagobind Jena, environmentalists Hemanta Kumar Rout and Ashok Kumar Swain have noted that 4-5 lakh turtles visit this area every year, which takes the nature lovers and wildlife by surprise.

The rare Olive Ridley turtles have been placed in the Red Data Book of International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) which has mentioned that only one out of 1,000 hatchlings grow into a fully developed adult. This has raised concerns over the growth of Olive Ridley population.

Gahirmatha, spread over 1,435 sqkm, has been designated as a separate national park area from Bhitarkanika since 1997. Out of the total area of the

marine sanctuary, only 27 sqkm is land mass. However, erosion has affected land areas like Madali, Babubali, and Ekakula.

Moreover, Agarnashi Island has been fully gobbled up by

Meanwhile, experts have opined that massive mangrove plantation can check coastal erosion to a great extent.

Absence of proper nesting sites and death of the turtles at regular intervals have posed grave threats to the conservation efforts.

Moreover, the Forest department lacks proper boats to chase and nab the illegally operating fishing trawlers which pose threats to the turtles. Adding to the problem, Marine police stations at Tantiapal, . Kharinasi and Jambu are grappling with staff crunch which makes the efforts ineffective.

These apart, prawn gherries discharging chemicals into the sea also poses threats to this marine creature.

The state government has taken up a slew of measures for protection of Olive Ridley turtles. The marine species has been the mascot during several events and eco-tourism launched by the state government.

When contacted, Rajnagar Divisional Forest Officer (DFO) Sudarshan Gopinath Yadav said that the department has been holding camps on the coastlines and deploying armed personnel for the safety of the turtles. Patrolling has been intensified, he added.

However, despite the extensive measures for turtle protection, illegal entry of trawlers and lack of patrol boats stand as a stumbling block on the way of turtle protection.

Notably, in 2023, more than 70 boats and trawlers were seized for illegally operating in restricted zones, while over 300 cases were filed

Vigilance sleuths detain doc, pharmacist for taking bribe Bhuyan demanded 10 per cent

Koraput, Nov 8: Anti-corruption Vigilance officials Friday detained a doctor and a pharmacist from a government hospital for accepting a bribe of Rs 40,000 from a contractual nursing officer at Boipariguda in Koraput district.

The accused have been identified as Dr Biswajit Bhuyan, the Medical Officer in-charge at Boipariguda Community Health Centre (CHC), and Uttam Mahankuda, the pharmacist, officials said.

The two were trapped by Vigilance sleuths following an allegation from the nursing officer, whose services had recently been regularised.

She was entitled to an arrear payment of approximately Rs 4.83.572 after the government ordered the release of differential financial benefits from October 2022 onwards

According to the complainant, despite repeated requests, Dr of the arrear amount as bribe in exchange for processing the payment. He allegedly refused to release the arrears until the bribe was paid and even threatened to transfer her to a remote location if she did not comply.

Left with no other option, the nursing officer approached the Vigilance authorities, who subsequently caught Dr Bhuyan while accepting the bribe through the pharmacist, the anti-corruption wing stated in an official release.

The statement also mentioned that Dr Bhuyan had previously faced multiple allegations of demanding bribes and misusing the CHC vehicle.

Simultaneous searches were carried out at three locations associated with Dr Bhuyan and one location linked to Mahankuda. the pharmacist. A case has been registered against both under various sections of the Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988

In a first, jumbo, tiger census to be conducted twice this yr



Bhanjanagar, Nov 8: The state government is undertaking the census of elephants and tigers twice annually for the first time this year from November 14 to November 16. The headcount will be conducted across all 51 Forest Divisions in the state during that period. Preparations will be taken up for the purpose November 13.

The matter came to the fore after a training camp was conducted in this regard at Lalsingh Nursery within the Ghumusar North Forest Division at Bhanjanagar in Ganjam district. Thursday, During the event. Divisional Forest Officer (DFO) Himanshu Shekhar Mohanty led the

training of forest personnel for elephant census. The forest division has set up 75 units for this purpose. Among others, Assistant Conservator of Forests (ACF) Bibek Das and Ranger Bimbadhar Sahu addressed the gathering.

It is noteworthy that the Central government usually conducts elephant census once in every two years. However, due to the COVID-19 outbreak, no census has been conducted since 2019.

In the meantime, a state-level elephant census was conducted in March this year. Now, steps are being taken to count elephants twice a year. This initiative aims to properly monitor jumbo population growth

Similarly, from October last year to January this year, a tiger census was conducted in the state. Sources said preparations are now underway for another headcount of the big cats which will span over a month. Preparations are also ongoing for

the elephant census in the Ghumusar South Forest Division. This process is being closely supervised by DFO Binod Acharya. Multiple units have been formed within the forest division for the purpose. During the census. Forest Protection Committee members will assist the counting staff.

On the other hand, the tiger census is being conducted under strict confidentiality. Trap cameras have been installed in order to spot and catch poachers who are roaming freely in the forests. Forest personnel are reportedly monitoring these cameras round the clock. Furthermore, departmental authorities have directed the staff to ensure that no information is leaked during the census.

Pragmatic Approach

t's interesting to see Cabinet Secretary T V Somanathan shaking things up with the decades-old practice of sending demi-official (DO) letters. For those of us familiar with the inner workings of the Indian babudom, this is a significant move. Let's face it—what started in 1964 as a crisp, meaningful way for secretaries to keep the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) updated on important developments has, over time, become a bit of a bureaucratic relic.

Originally, these letters were brief, personal notes meant to highlight key issues. But as with many things, they morphed into lengthy, almost ritualistic documents—often bloated with unnecessary information. Instead of being insightful, they turned into mere compilations of data, losing the essence of what they were meant to achieve.

Somanathan's most recent memo is spot on. He has urged secretaries to ditch the cumbersome and laborious monthly reports and go back to the purpose of these letters, which was to provide brief updates that had real significance. He's talking about one or two pages max, focusing on policy bottlenecks, significant pending proposals, and any other crucial issues. This isn't just about cutting down on paperwork; it's about making sure the communication is actually effective and

It's also worth noting that with tools like E-Samiksha already in

place, the need for these voluminous letters has clearly diminished. Somanathan's push to streamline this practice reflects a broader shift in how the government is trying to adapt to more efficient, digital-first



For observers, it's refreshing to see this pragmatic approach. This could be a small but important step towards a more responsive and

Goa's call for a dedicated cadre

There's a growing call for Goa to have its own IAS, IPS, and IFS cadre—a point that Goa Forward Party (GFP) president Vijai Sardesai recently made loud and clear. And for many Goans, it makes perfect sense. Local officers understand Goa's unique needs, culture, and challenges so much better than outsiders who are often posted here for just a few months. They'd be more invested in the state's development and more in sync with the people.

Sardesai's letter to Chief Minister Pramod Sawant urged him to take up this issue with the Ministry of Home Affairs. He pointed out how Goa's identity is defined by its language, culture, heritage, and even its legal frameworks—elements that make this state unlike any other. When officers come here on short-term assignments, they barely scratch the surface. Many don't stick around long enough to truly understand the socio-political landscape, let alone bond with the people they're supposed to serve.

This disconnect often leads to a lack of trust. Long-time observers have noted that some officers even come across as arrogant or indifferent, and others, worried about future postings, avoid making bold decisions that might actually benefit Goa. Sardesai's missive also reminded us that Goa has tried to create its own cadre before, but the attempts fizzled out. Now, more than ever, it feels like the right time to revisit this. A dedicated Goa cadre could streamline governance, build stronger ties between the administration and the public, and ensure that such officers are genuinely accountable to the state and its people.

Curse of overwork or just carelessness?

Bureaucratic missteps are making headlines more often than they should. Are babus simply careless, or is it the crushing workload pushing them into these cringe-worthy blunders? Either way, these mistakes aren't just a personal embarrassment—they drag entire departments and governments into the spotlight.

The recent mix-up in Haryana is a prime example. In an order dated November 3, 2024, the state managed to appoint two IAS officers, Munish Sharma and Dr Jainder Singh Chillar, as Deputy Commissioners of Charkhi Dadri. A district with two heads? That's not just unusual; it's downright confusing.

Kerala wasn't spared either, as your columnist reported earlier. On the same day, Pranabjyoti Nath (IAS: 2005: KL) was appointed by the state as Chief Electoral Officer and by the Centre as Chief Vigilance Officer of NALCO. It seems like coordination between the state and Centre could use some serious improvement.

Then there's Anindita Mitra (IAS: 2007: PB), who had a farewell party in Chandigarh only to be extended for three more months—after she had already reported back to Punjab. Talk about mixed signals!

The topper? The Department of Personnel and Training (DoPT) dated an order for October 30, 2024, but mistakenly wrote November 30, 2024. A harmless typo? Perhaps, but in government documents, even minor errors can have major repercussions.

These aren't isolated incidents. Over six months, the growing list of administrative goof-ups suggests something more than mere oversight. Maybe it's time to cut down the workload or at least double-check before making public announcements. Mistakes are human but minimizing them is key to maintaining trust.

Time to avoid the breakdown

atest in India-Canada ties is the attack **d**on Hindu Mahasabha temple in Brampton. Prime Minister Narendra Modi has jumped into the ring with a tweet on Monday evening, the 4th of November. So far, Ministry of External Affairs has been reacting to or commenting on Canada's allegations and counter-allegations etc. Prime Minister of Canada Justin Trudeau has been levelling charges against India, starting with his statement to Parliament last year about Indian agencies' involvement in the murder of Hardeep Singh Nijjar, a Canadian citizen.

Unusually, Prime Minister Modi has personally reacted to an unsavoury development in Canada, i.e. the said attack on the temple. He said, "We strongly condemn the deliberate attack on the Hindu temple in Canada. Equally appalling are the cowardly attempts to intimidate our diplomats. Such acts of violence will never weaken India's resolve. We expect the Canadian Government to ensure justice and the rule of law". A strong statement indeed.

Many eyebrows were raised at this incident. A former Minister of Canada of Indian origin has commented that a red line has been crossed by the Khalistani militants. He was apprehensive too of the bias

of the Canadian authorities. Read his words, "I begin to feel that there is some grain of truth in the reports that, in addition to political apparatus, Khalistanis have effectively infiltrated into our law enforcement agencies"

India and Canada have had friendly relations for a long time. As of now, about 8.30,000 people of Indian origin live in Canada. Sikhs alone constitute 2 per cent of Canada's population of 40 million. Because of their concentration in pockets, they are electorally quite strong in the first-past-the-poll system. Justin Trudeau's government survives on the support of a Sikh political entity called National Democratic Party. A large number of students from India make Canada their first port of call for higher studies.

Where did the ties go wrong? Some observers attribute the nosedive in bilateral relations to the bombing of the Indian aircraft in 1985. The popular impression in India is that Canada did not strongly investigate the bombing and punish the culprits. But actually, the relationship went on a downward spiral since 2023. Justin Trudeau accused India of conspiracy in Nijjar's killing in the Canadian Parliament without submitting concrete evidence. Gurpatwant Singh Pannun released a video message in 2023 threatening Hindus to leave Canada. He warned people of not flying by Air India which may be attacked. And worse. Pannun claimed that he has been advising the Canadian Prime Minister.

A Hindu temple in Windsor, Canada was defaced with anti-India graffiti. Another temple in Mississauga was targeted. Khalistani militants openly glorified the killers of former Prime Minister Indira Gandhi during a parade in the city of Brampton. More than 20 cases of vandalism at Hindu temples were reported in the last two years. These developments give the impression to the Indian leadership and the public that Justin Trudeau is soft on Khalistanis and their sympathisers in exchange of their political support to his government.

Whatever may be the compulsions and provocations on either side, whether India and Canada should confront each other and fail to resolve the differences? Is this confrontation, diplomatic as it is now, unavoidable?

Not really. Both India and Canada emphasise on diplomacy and dialogue in order to diffuse tensions in relations. It is time they interrogate their approaches and utterances. It is time citizens in both countries ask their leadership some searching questions. Indian leadership as well

as public should realise that Canada is a member of G-7, G-20, NATO and Five Eyes. India needs the West for new technology, investment, markets for its export and allies to balance China. New Delhi certainly has genuine concerns about anti-India activities in Canada. But without engaging in dialogue, confronting Canada may not be a bright idea. Instead of attributing electoral motives to Trudeau. which are of course credible, India should hit the nail on the head by seeking evidence and demystifying the impressions.

The bone of contention between India and Canada is not beyond a diplomatic resolution. In the murder of Nijjar, who was on the look-out notice of India and most probably a victim of inter-gang war should not derail the bilateralism between two significant democracies. Any extra-judicial killing is illegal and reprehensible. Yet, it behoves on both countries to take a calm and calculated perspective on issues and restore normalcy in relations between both countries



The NMCG issued the directions to the district administration on a complaint filed by Gupta on the basis of an RT query, which revealed that the absence of sewage treatment plants in Kedarnath is leading to rising pollution levels in the Mandakini, a tributary of the Ganga, with untreated waste being released directly into it.

Guwahati, Nov 8: The Central government and various central intelligence agencies have alerted the northeastern states about the activities of Jamaat-ul-Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) and its associate outfits, officials said Thursday.

A top police official said that after getting the Centre's directives, all the central and state intelligence agencies further stepped up its vigilance all across the mixed populated, bordering and vulnerable areas.

"Among the seven northeast-

ern states, Bangladesh-based terror outfits always have a target in Assam and Tripura to expand their base due to geopolitical and demographic reasons. However, these groups never succeeded in their plans as the alert Indian agencies thwarted their plans at the initial stage,' the official told IANS, refusing to be quoted. Assam Police during the last year have arrested many suspected cadres for allegedly having links with Bangladeshi terror module Ansarullah Bangla Team (ABT) and Al-Qaeda in the Indian Subcontinent (AQIS).

These cadres were arrested from different districts and bordering areas of Assam.

According to the official,

cases have been registered against the detainees under various sections of the Indian Penal Code, Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, the Passport Act, 1920, and the Foreigners

The official said that the Bangladesh-based terror outfits' possible activities in the northeastern states would be discussed in the annual meeting of the Director General of Police-Inspector General of Police in New Delhi later this month.

Meanwhile, Central intelligence agencies have also alerted their state-level counterparts in West Bengal on JMB activities. Reports said that central intelligence agencies have also alerted about future plans and initiatives by JMB to reorganise their existing terror modules in seven districts which especially include those which are having borders with neighbouring Bangladesh.

These seven districts include Malda, Murshidabad, North Dinajpur, Birbhum, Nadia, North 24 Parganas and South 24 Parganas. After the Bangladesh unrest began in June-July, the Border Security Force (BSF) enhanced surveillance along the 4.096 km border with the neighbouring country to prevent trans-border crime and infiltration, the BSF officials said.

Five Indian states - West Bengal (2216 km), Tripura (856 km), Meghalaya (443 km), Mizoram (318 km) and Assam (263 km) share a border with

"The project aims to create an urban infrastructure that is resilient to climate and environmental risks such as floods and landslides, ensuring the safety and health of Uttarakhand's population," Oka said.

"It will also build the capacity of the state agencies in project management, climate-and disaster-resilient

nue generation, and gender mainstreaming.

The project will enhance transportation, urban mobility, drainage, flood management, and overall public services in Haldwani, the economic hub of the state. Additionally, it will improve water supply delivery in four cities - Champawat, Kichha, Kotdwar, and Vikasnagar by developing efficient and climate-resilient water sup-

ply systems. In Haldwani, the project lish an intelligent traffic management system, deploy compressed natural gas bus es, and pilot electric buses To prepare the city against disasters, the project will construct 36 km of storm water and roadside drains to improve flood management and implement an early warning system. A green-cer tified administrative complex and bus terminal will be built to improve the delivery of public services. In the other four cities,

the project aims to increase water service coverage to 100 per cent by constructing 1,024 km of climate-resilient pipelines with smart water meters, 26 tubewells new reservoirs, and a 3.5 million-litre-per-day water treatment plant. Sanitation coverage in Vikasnagar will be improved by sewage treatment facilities that will ben efit around 2,000 households. The project will introduce initiatives for women, such as livelihood skills training on driving buses, bus tick eting, and the operation of electric charging stations. Given women's role in monitoring water supply systems, the project will build the capacity of women, including those from vulnerable households, in operating and managing water supply and sanitation services.

The European Investment Bank is also co-financing the project with \$191 million on a parallel basis.

SC asks for authentic audio clips against CM

New Delhi, Nov 8: The Supreme Court Friday directed a Kuki organisation to produce material to indicate authenticity of some leaked audio clips on the basis of which it filed a plea seeking a court-monitored SIT probe into the alleged role of the Manipur chief minister in the ethnic violence.

A bench of Chief Justice of India DY Chandrachud and Justices JB Pardiwala and Manoj Misra also said it has a duty as constitutional court and does not appreciate any attempt to brush things under the carpet.

It asked advocate Prashant Bhushan, appearing for Kuki Organization for Human Rights Trust (KOHUR), to place material on record to show credibility of the audio clips.

"Before the court can consider the submissions which have been made on the basis of an audio clip, we deem it appropriate to grant the petitioner to file before this court the material indicating the authenticity of the clips," the bench said.

At the outset, Bhushan submitted that the recorded conversation prima facie shows the complicity and the involvement of the state machinery in violence against Kuki Zo com-

He claimed the clips had "disturbing conversations" and the chief minister could be heard instigating the violence and protecting the attackers.

He also alleged the chief minister not only fuelled the violence there but also allowed arms and ammunition to be

Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the state government, strongly opposed the plea, saying the organisation should approach the Manipur High Court.

He submitted that if the apex court entertained the matter, the "majesty of the high court would be undermined'

Attorney General R Venkataramani also opposed the petition and said the state government should be given leeway to restore peace.

"We do not know the position on the ground. We have a po-



rous border. We have materials coming from across the border. Your lordships are sitting in an ivory tower," Mehta submitted.

The bench took objection to this comment and said, "We are not living in an ivory tower. It is because we are not sitting in an ivory tower that we have not dismissed the petition. We are also aware of what is happening in Manipur. We have a duty as constitu-

tional court. We don't appreciate any attempt to brush things under the carpet."

Mehta apologised for his remark and said the term was not used in a pejorative sense.

The Kuki organisation's plea in top court said, "It is apparent from the aforementioned conversation that the chief minister of Manipur was instrumental in inciting, organizing and thereafter centrally orchestrating the large-scale murder, destruction and other form of violence against the Kuki dominated areas in Manipur.'

"Petitioner is praying for a court monitored investigation by Special Investigation Team into leaked audio tapes clips as there is clear and strong prima facie evidence showing involvement of highest functionary i.e. chief minister of a state. The investigation would need to unearth the conspiracy which appears to involve the highest functionary of state," the plea

The Kuki organisation said in the instant case, investigation cannot be done by any of the regular investigation agencies like CBI, ED etc. and would have to be done by a special investigative team of officers of impeccable integrity selected by this court.

Asked about the clip during a recent PTI interview, Chief Minister N Biren Singh had said, "Some people are after me... there is a conspiracy. The matter is sub judice. I won't talk much about it. An FIR has been filed.'

India votes against Pakistan resolution

United Nations, Nov 8: India voted against a resolution by Pakistan on 'Conventional arms control at the regional and subregional levels'.

The resolution by Pakistan and Syria on 'Conventional arms control at the regional and subregional levels' in the First Committee of the UN General Assembly was adopted by recorded vote with 179 members voting in favour, an abstention by Israel while India was the sole country voting against the resolution. The First Committee of the

UNGA deals with disarmament, global challenges and threats to peace that affect the international community.

"Convinced that conventional arms control needs to be pursued primarily in the regional and subregional contexts since most threats to peace and security in the post- cold-war era arise mainly among states located in the same region or subregion,' the resolution said.

It notes "with particular interest the initiatives taken in this regard in different regions of the world, in particular the consultations among a number of Latin American countries and the proposals for conventional arms control made in the context of South Asia, and recognising, in the context of this subject, the relevance and value of conventional arms control in regional security.'

The resolution, "believing that militarily significant states and states with larger military capabilities have a special responsibility in promoting such agreements for regional security," decided to give "urgent consideration to the issues involved in conventional arms control at the regional and subregional levels."

New bench to decide on **AMU's minority status: SC**



New Delhi, Nov 8: The contentious legal question over Aligarh Muslim Unversity's minority status would be decided by a new bench, the Supreme Court held Friday and overruled the 1967 judgement that said the university cannot be considered a rity institution since it was created by a

In a 4:3 majority verdict, a Constitution bench headed by Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud. said a legislation or an executive action that discriminated against religious or linguistic minorities in establishing or administering educational institutions, was ultra vires Article 30(1) of the Constitution.

Article 30 deals with the right of minorities to establish and administer educational institutions. Article 30 (1) says all minorities, whether based on religion or language, shall have the right to establish and administer educational institutions of their choice.

"The view taken in Azeez Basha (1967 verdict) that an educational institution is not established by a minority if it derives its legal character through a statute, is overruled,' held the CJI, who authored the

Supreme Court directed that AMU's status would be determined afresh following the

118-page verdict, also on behalf of Justices Sanjiv Khanna, J B Pardiwala and Manoi Misra.

A five-judge Constitution bench in the S Azeez Basha v. Union of India in 1967 said AMU was a central university and couldn't be considered a minority institution.

"Additionally, a linguistic or religious minority which has established an educational institution receives the guarantee of greater autonomy in administration. This is the 'special rights' reading of the provision," the majority verdict said.

Justice Chandrachud held that religious or linguistic minorities must prove that they established the educational institution for the community to be a minority educational institution for the purposes of

"The right guaranteed by Article 30(1) is applicable to universities established before the commencement of the Constitution," he said.

The CJI outlined the factors which must be used to determine if a minority has 'established" an educational institution. "The indicia of ideation, purpose and imple mentation must be satisfied. The idea for establishing an educational institution must have stemmed from a person or group belonging to the minority community and the educational institution must be established predominantly for the benefit of minority community," he wrote.

Implementation of the idea was stated to be another factor taken by the members of the minority community.

"The administrative-set up of the educational institution must elucidate and affirm (i) the minority character of the educational institution; and (ii) that it was established to protect and promote the interests of the minority community," it said. The question whether AMU was a minority educational institution must be decided based on the principles laid down in the judgment, it underscored. Judicial records of the case were, therefore, directed to be placed before a regular bench, after receiving instructions from the CJI on the administrative side, for deciding the minority issue and adjudicating appeals against a 2006 verdict of the Allahabad High Court, which struck down a provision of the 1981 law according minority status to AMU.

The majority verdict also held the 1981 reference by a twojudge bench, which had questioned the correctness of the 1967 verdict and had referred the matter to a seven-judge bench, was valid.

Kishtwar: Hunt on to track down terrorists

Kishtwar/Jammu, Nov 8: The bodies of two village defence guards (VDG) killed by terrorists in Jammu and Kashmir's Kishtwar district were Friday recovered from near a rivulet during a search operation, officials said.

A massive cordon-and-search operation is also underway in Kishtwar to track down the terrorists responsible for the killings. According to officials, the two VDGs were executed by terrorists Thursday after being abducted in the higher reaches of Kishtwar district. Their bodies were spotted lying near a rivulet in the Pondgwari area in Keshwan belt.

The Army and Special Operations Group (SOG), after locating the bodies, carefully conducted an operation to recover them, the officials said, adding that the bodies are being transported to the deceased's homes in the district.

A joint search operation involving the police, Army, and Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) has been launched in a dense forest area following the gruesome killings, which have been condemned by Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah, and leaders from the People's Democratic Party, Congress, and the BJP. The operation is concentrated in the Kuntwara, Ohli, and Munzla Dhar hilly areas, with reinforcements dispatched early this morn-

2 terrorists killed

Srinagar: Two terrorists were killed Friday in an overnight encounter with security forces in Jammu and Kashmir's Baramulla district. Their identification and affiliation are being ascertained, the Kashmir Zone police posted on X. Incriminating materials, arms and ammunition were recovered from the slain terrorists following the encounter which started Thursday night after the security forces launched an intelligence-based operation.

ing, the officials said. Security forces have intensified efforts. deploying drones and sniffer dogs, with a helicopter seen hovering over the forested area this morning, they added. Kashmir Tigers, an offshoot of Pakistan-based terror group Jaish-e-Mohammad, claimed responsibility for the killings, sharing images of the victims with blindfolded eyes.

Kishtwar, along with other districts in the Jammu region such as Rajouri, Poonch, Reasi, Udhampur, Doda, and Kathua, has seen a rise in terror attacks this year, attributed by security agencies to attempts by cross-border handlers to revive militancy in the otherwise peaceful region. Lieutenant Governor Sinha strongly condemned the heinous terrorist attack on VDG members and reiterated the government's resolve to destroy all terror outfits and avenge the barbaric act.

CJI Chandrachud: A legacy of landmark verdicts, controversies

New Delhi, Nov 8: He has judgments such as the Ayodhya land dispute, the abrogation of Article 370 and the decriminalisation of consensual gay sex that shaped society and politics to his name. India's 50th Chief Justice DY Chandrachud, known also for his many pithy statements, leaves an imprint all his own on the annals of legal history.

Friday was the last day in court for Chandrachud, or DYC as he is often referred to, capping a long career as lawyer, Supreme Court judge and head of the country's judiciary. The ever articulate Chandrachud. who actually demits office Sunday, penned more than 500 judgments, some panned and many praised

The Chandrachud legacy has a physical manifestation too - a reimagined 'Lady Justice'. The earlier 'Goddess of Justice' in Grecian robes with blindfold

and sword has been replaced by a six-ft tall sculpture with scales in one hand and the Constitution in another. She is in a sari, with a crown and sans

While that created a stir so did the decision on his penultimate day at work with the Supreme Court rechristening its summer vacation "partial court working days", an issue that has led to criticism that the apex court judges enjoyed long breaks.

In his last days in office, the CJI stirred another controversy when he said in a public function that he prayed to the "deity" for a solution to the polarising dispute. The comment was reproduced widely and elicited sharp reactions from various quarters, including politicians and activists,

Chandrachud, who also attracted attention when Prime Minister Narendra Modi attended a widely publicised Ganesh puja at his home, was

the author of the lead judgment that unanimously upheld the 2019 revocation of Article 370 that gave special status to the erstwhile state of Jammu and Kashmir. Besides, he was on the bench

that delivered path-breaking judgments on decriminalising same-sex relations and partially struck down Section 377 of the IPC on so-called unnatural sex (of carnal intercourse against the order of the nature).



ed on their own agenda. The incident occurred October 21 when the samosas and cake meant for the Chief Minister -- who was visiting the CID headquarters here -- were accidentally served to his security


staff. The CID report ensued,

as did the Opposition's attack and the government's counter-attack.

Sukhu said in Delhi Friday the probe was into "misbehaviour" of officials but the media is presenting it as an enquiry into the missing samosas. Sukhu claimed the BJP has been running a smear campaign against the Congress government since his party won a majority in the elections. 'The probe was about

misbehaviour of officials but the media has turned it into a CID probe into samosas. The DGP has already given a clarification in this regard," Sukhu told reporters here. "The BJP's behaviour in raking up this issue is childish and laughable," he said.

Reiterating that it was an internal matter, CID Director General Ranihan Oiha said in Shimla, "The Chief Minister was the chief guest at the



launch of a data centre for the cybercrime wing.

Ojha added, "Neither have we issued any notice nor have we called for any explanation. The matter should not be politicised. We simply asked for clarification as to what happened, and a written report was submitted. We have no intention of taking action against anyone.'

Several BJP leaders launched

an attack on the government over the issue. Leader of Opposition in the state Assembly Jai Ram Thakur alleged the Himachal Pradesh government takes decisions without applying its mind and then tries to change them when they become a matter of joke.

"The Opposition has not eaten those samosas, those who were served those samosas were a

part of the government, so how could the act be anti-government?" Thakur said in a video statement issued in Shimla. He said the state government and the chief minister must have found the matter serious enough to conduct an enquiry.

Thakur said the allegations of corruption in various departments of the state government are not being probed but an inquiry was ordered into the missing samosas.

Former state BJP chief Satpal Satti said the police should focus on probing scandals, "from the CM's office to the secretariat, instead of wasting their time on petty matters".

"It is surprising to hold an inquiry into such a small issue. I feel the Congress government is not bothered about people as their main concern is how samosas are being served at their functions. This government has totally failed and become a laughing stock," he said in a statement in Shimla.

The BJP's chief spokesperson Randhir Sharma said in a statement, "The state government is not concerned about the development of Himachal Pradesh. Its sole focus seems to be 'chief minister's samosa'. This incident highlights a lack of coordination between the of ficials and employees, as well as negligence on their part."



Pakistan closes park, zoo amid smog crisis

Lahore: Authorities in a broad swath of eastern Pakistan closed all public parks, zoos and museums, historical places, and playgrounds for 10 days as a record-breaking smog wave choked 18 districts of Punjab province, sickening tens of thousands of people. Lahore residents went about their lives in a twilight gloom that lingered over the city for hours, reducing visibility to around 100 metres. "These measures to ban the entry of people to such places are part of the Punjab government's efforts aimed at protecting the health of people," said Sajid Bashir, the spokesperson for the Environment Protection Department in Punjab.

Mozambique protest: Three killed, 66 injured

Maputo: Mozambique's largest hospital said Friday that at least three people were killed and 66 injured during clashes between police and protesters the previous day over a disputed election. The fatalities add to at least 18 people killed in earlier protests since the October 9 poll, which the Opposition claims was rigged. Thursday's protests were the biggest Mozambique has ever seen against Frelimo, the party that has ruled the southern African state since 1975 and was declared winner of last month's election by a

Russian President Vladimir Putin has praised India's emergence as a global power, stating that the country deserves recognition as a 'superpower'

Moscow, Nov 8: India deserves to be included in the list of global superpowers as its economy is currently growing faster than in any other country, Russian President Vladimir Putin has said.

Addressing the plenary session of the Valdai Discussion Club in Sochi Thursday, Putin also said Russia is developing relations with India in all directions and there is a great degree of trust in bilateral ties.

"India should undoubtedly be added to the list of superpowers, with its billion-anda-half population, the fastest growth among all economies in the world, ancient culture and very good prospects for further growth," he said.

Calling India a great country, Putin said: "We are developing relations with India in all directions. India is a great country, now the largest in terms of population: 1.5 billion people, plus 10 million every

He said India is leading the world in economic growth.

"Our vision of where and at what pace our relations will develop is based on today's re-



ndia is a great country, now on: 1.5 billion people, plus 10 nillion every year

alities. The volume of our cooperation is increasing many times over, every year," Putin was quoted by Russian news agency Tass as saving.

Putin added that the contacts between India and Russia in the security and defence sphere are developing.

ship. We don't just sell our weapons to India; we design them jointly," he said.

Putin named the BrahMos cruise missile project as an example.

"This is widely known and no one has issues with that, but high level of mutual trust and cooperation. So this is what we will keep doing in the near term, and, I hope, will continue to do in the more distant future," he said.

Putin acknowledged certain difficulties on the border between India and China, the agency reported.

However, he said wise and competent people who keep the future of their nations in mind, are searching for compromises and will eventually find them.

"If this approach continues to gain momentum, compromises can be found, and they will be found," Putin said.

India-China relations soured after the 2020 Galwan Valley clash, the most severe military confrontation in decades. However, recent diplomatic breakthroughs have brought new hope.

On October 21, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri announced an agreement with China following extensive negotiations, focused on troop disengagement along the Line of Actual Control in eastern Ladakh, marking a significant step toward resolving the long-standing standoff.

The US military acknowledged the videos circulating online showing what appeared to be a flaming aircraft dropping out of the sky and a field of burning debris in what those off-camera described as an area of Yemen's al-Jawf province. Portrait of English mathematician Alan **Turing was created by** Ai-Da, one of the most advanced robots in the world

London, Nov 8: A portrait of English mathematician Alan Turing became the first artwork by a humanoid robot to be sold at auction, fetching more than \$1.0 million Thursday.

The 2.2-metre portrait "AI God" by "Ai-Da", the world's first ultra-realistic robot artist, went for \$1,084,800, smashing pre-sale expectations of \$180,000 at auction house Sotheby's Digital Art Sale.

"Today's record-breaking sale price for the first artwork by a humanoid robot artist to go up for auction marks a moment in



the history of modern and contemporary art and reflects the growing intersection between AI technology and the global art market," said the auction house.

Ai-Da Robot, which uses AI to speak, said: "The key value of my work is its capacity to serve as a catalyst for dialogue about

emerging technologies.' Ai-Da added that a "portrait of pioneer Alan Turing invites viewers to reflect on the godlike nature of AI and computing while considering the ethical and societal implications of these advancements. The ultra-realistic robot, one

of the most advanced in the world, is designed to resemble a human woman with a face, large eyes and a brown wig. Ai-Da is named after Ada

Lovelace, the world's first computer programmer and was devised by Aidan Meller,

a specialist in modern and contemporary art.

The greatest artists in history grappled with their period of time, and both celebrated and questioned society's shifts," said Ai-Da is

Meller. "Ai-Da Robot as technology, is the perfect artist today to discuss the current devel-

opments with technology and its unfolding legacy," he added.

Ai-Da generates ideas through conversations with members of the studio, and suggested creating an image of Turing during a discussion about "AI for good'

The robot was then asked what style, colour, content, tone and texture to use, before using cameras in its eves to look at a picture of Turing and

Meller led the team that created Ai-Da with artificial intelligence specialists at the universities of Oxford and Birmingham in

SBI profit jumps

Mumbai: SBI Friday reported a 23 per cent on-year jump in consolidated net profit at ₹19,782 crore for the quarter ended September 30, 2024. The consolidated net profit for the corresponding period last year stood at ₹16,099 crore. On a standalone basis, the country's largest lender reported a net profit of ₹18,331 crore, as against ₹14,330 crore in the year ago period and ₹17,035 crore in the preceding quarter.

Vedanta logs loss

New Delhi: Mining conglomerate Vedanta Ltd Friday reported a consolidated net profit of ₹4,352 crore in the September 2024 quarter on the back of lower tax expenses. However, the company posted a consolidated net loss of ₹1,783 crore in the year-ago period. Its tax expenses dropped to ₹2,030 crore against ₹9,092 crore in the July-September period a year ago. The company's consolidated income during the quarter declined to ₹38,934 crore over ₹39,585 a year ago.

LIC profit drops

Mumbai: Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC). the country's biggest insurer. posted a 3.8% fall in secondquarter profit Friday as it paid out higher benefits, while new business margins for the half-year expanded, LIC's profit after tax fell to ₹76.21 billion for the quarter ended September 30 from ₹79.25 billion a year earlier. Zomato, Swiggy in soup

Competition Commission of India finds the food delivery giants breached antitrust laws and dealt exclusively with some partners

New Delhi, Nov 8: An investigation by India's antitrust body found food delivery giants Zomato and SoftBank-backed Swiggy breached competition laws, with their business practices favouring select restaurants listed on their platforms, documents show.

Zomato entered into "exclusivity contracts" with partners in return for lower commissions, while Swiggy guaranteed business growth to certain players if they listed exclusively on its platform, according to non-public documents prepared by the Competition Commission of India (CCI).

Exclusivity arrangements between Swiggy, Zomato and their respective restaurant partners "prevent the market from becoming more competitive," the CCI's investigation arm noted in its findings reviewed by Reuters Friday.

The CCI documents are not public, in line with its confidentiality rules, and were shared with Swiggy, Zomato and the complainant restaurant group in March 2024. Their findings have not been previously re-

Inflation to rise further to 5.81%

Bangalore, Nov 8: Consumer price inflation in India climbed to a 14-month high of 5.81% in October primarily due to a spike in vegetable and edible oil prices, a Reuters poll of economists predicted, a shade below the central bank's tolerance threshold of 6.0%.

Food prices, which make up nearly half of the inflation basket, likely increased at a faster pace last month. Tomatoes, a key ingredient in every Indian kitchen, are expected to have surged by double digits in price as uneven rains disrupted production.

The government's decision to raise import taxes on edible oils by 20 percentage points in mid-September also likely helped to drive prices up faster, further straining household





New coach for Chopra by year-end

Star javelin thrower to travel to Potchefstroom, South Africa for 31-day training stint this month

New Delhi, Indian athletics chief hakrishcoach Rad nan Nair stated Friday that a new coach for star javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra will be aped by the end of the year. Chopra recentparted ways with German coach Klaus Bartonietz, ending a hugely successful fiveyear stint. Bartonietz decided to call it a day

citing personal reasons. Chopra will also travel to Potchefstroom, South Africa later this month for an off-season training stint to start early preparation for next year's competitions. The 26-year-old double Olympic medallist, who last competed in Brussels in the Diamond League Final in September, will spend 31 days in the South African city. His training stint will be funded by the Sports Ministry, officials said.

"(He) will start his training early and will be in Potchefstroom for a period of 31 days,' the ministry said in a statement on Friday. "Neeraj's training session will be funded by Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports (MYAS) and the expenditure will cover his and his physiotherapist's lodging, boarding and training cost for the period of his stay in South Africa," the release added.

In the past, Chopra has trained in Potchefstroom many times, including ahead of Tokyo and Paris Olympics. He also took part in a competition there in January 2020, just before the Covid-19 pandemic struck the world.

Chopra battled an adductor muscle niggle throughout the year and it also affected his performance at both the Paris Olympics and the Diamond League Final, where he competed with a fractured left hand. He had earlier spoken about consulting doctors at the end of the season to decide whether to go for a surgery to fix the problem.

However while talking to this agency September 27, he had played down injury concerns and also stated that he will look to improve his technique. "It was an injury-plagued year but it is fine now, I will be 100 per cent fit for the new season," he



In the semis Urja will face Aradhya while Sweta will take on Shakshi for a place in the title round.

Melbourne, Nov 8: Legendary England cricketer, Sir Ian Botham has shared an incredible story of how his one-time fierce rival-turned-friend, Merv Hughes, a former Australian pacer, came to his rescue after a terrifying fall into crocodile and shark-infested waters in Australia's tropical north region. The mishap took place on the Moyle River, located about 200 kilometers south of Darwin, where Botham and Hughes were fishing for barramundi.

Botham, 68, was on a fourday fishing expedition with his former Ashes rival when things took a dangerous turn. While attempting to move on the boat, his footwear snagged on a rope, causing him to tumble and land heavily, resulting

in severe bruising and a close call with a saltwater crocodile.

Reflecting on the incident, Botham humorously noted, "At the end of the day, Crocodile Beefy survived," cleverly referencing his nickname along with the popular Australian

film, Crocodile Dundee.

"I was out of the water quicker than I went in. Quite a few sets of (crocodile) eyes were having a peep at me. Luckily I had no time to think about what was in the water," Botham said. "The guys were brilliant, it was

just one of those accidents. It was all very quick and I'm OK now," the former England cap-

Botham and Hughes were known for their fierce on-field battles during the Ashes in the 1980s, with the Englishman fa mously hitting the Australian pacer for 22 runs in a single over - a record for the most runs scored in one over in an Ashes Test at the time.

Despite their rivalry, Botham and Hughes have remained friends since retiring from cricket. Botham played 102 Tests for England scoring 5.200 runs with 14 centuries. He also picked up 383 wickets. In 116 ODIs he scored 2,113 runs and bagged 145 wickets.

The Moyle river is known to have roughly five crocodiles per square kilometre.
